Focus

A limit to the number of items

Offline update / information papers



Strategy

O&S should ensure that work programmes reflect a year-long view (or more) and become more strategic.



Promotion

Advertising work more widely and circulating information on outcomes to national databases



Evaluation

Make formal recommendations on each major item

Actively monitor recommendations

Evaluate work by <u>national</u> standards

AMPLIFY THE CONCERNS OF PUBLIC

Co-option

Engaging with those outside the council through co-option of non-statutory, non-voting representatives



AMPLIFY THE CONCERNS OF PUBLIC

External Experts / Witnesses

Take greater advantage of the local presence of academics, researchers, professionals and service users



AMPLIFY THE CONCERNS OF PUBLIC

Primary & Secondary Research

Quantitative & Qualitative research into issues – where active involvement is difficult
