POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The City of Westminster statement of licensing policy applies to all applications where relevant representations have been made. The Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the City of Westminster statement of Licensing Policy and the guidance issued by the Secretary of state under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

GUIDANCE CONSIDERATIONS

The Licensing Authority is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under the Licensing Act 2003.

LIVE MUSIC ACT 2012

The Live Music Act amends the Licensing Act 2003 by:

- removing the licensing requirement for amplified live music taking place between 8am and 11pm before audiences of no more than 200 persons on premises authorised by a premises licence or club premises certificate to supply alcohol for consumption on the premises (at a time when those premises are open for the purposes of being used for the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises), subject to the right of a licensing authority to impose conditions about live music following a review of a premises licence or club premises certificate
- removing the licensing requirement for amplified live music taking place between 8am and 11pm before audiences of no more than 200 persons in workplaces not otherwise licensed under the 2003 Act (or licensed only for the provision of late night refreshment)
- removing the licensing requirement for unamplified live music taking place between 8am and 11pm in any place, subject to the right of a licensing authority to impose conditions about live music following a review of a premises licence or club premises certificate relating to premises authorised to supply alcohol for consumption on the premises
- removing the licensing requirement for the provision of entertainment facilities
- widens the licensing exemption for live music that is integral to a performance of Morris dancing or dancing of a similar type, so that the exemption applies to both live or recorded music instead of just unamplified live music in that instance.

I refer to the application for a new Premises Licence for the above premises.

The applicant has submitted plans of the premises, dated 4/02/16, showing the North part of Berkeley Square.

The applicant is seeking the following licensable activities:

- 1. To provide the following regulated entertainments 'indoors' and 'outdoors' on Monday to Saturday between 12:00 to 00:00 hours:
 - Films
 - Live Music
 - Recorded Music
 - Performances of Dance

- Provision of anything of a similar description to Live Music, Recorded Music or Performances of Dance
- 2. Provision of Late Night Refreshment 'indoors' and 'outdoors' on Monday to Saturday between 23:00 to 00:00 hours

I wish to make the following representations based on the plans submitted and the supporting operating schedule:

- The hours for and types of Regulated Entertainments requested may lead to an increase in Public Nuisance in the area and may adversely impact on Public Safety
- 2. The hours requested for and provision of Late Night Refreshment may lead to an increase in Public Nuisance in the area

Save for the for the location I understand this application is the same in all respects, including the operating schedule, as the Premises Licence, 06/07675/WCCMAP, which currently operates in the southern half of the square. The intention being that this Licence will be surrendered if the new Licence for the northern half is granted.

Although the conditions offered are extensive these will need to be updated based on 'model' wording and redundant ones removed.

The applicant is therefore requested to contact the undersigned to arrange a site visit discuss all of the above issues. Environmental Health may then also propose further conditions to allay its concerns.

Should you wish to discuss the matter further please do not hesitate to contact me.

For information – history check:

- Environmental Health records show that there have been no nuisance complaints at events when the noise condition limiting amplified music to 70dB (A) _{5min} has been complied with.
- Complaints have however been received at events staged in the Square where
 it was subsequently determined that this standard was not complied with. Such
 events have often been undertaken using TENs to allow for the provision of
 alcohol as a licensing activity.

Environmental Health recommendations for conditions:

Although this application is to move the existing licensable activities to the north part of the square with exactly the same conditions as currently operate on the existing licence for the south part of the Square (and subsequent surrender of this Licence on grant of the new Licence) Environmental Health recommends all of these conditions are replaced with the ones listed below. This is because many of the old conditions are considered to be ambiguous, duplicated and/or superfluous.

Current events like Lapada and Pad are lovely but frankly there are many other venues where they can be held such as the Grosvenor House where they were for years. Other events such as Glamour awards clog up Berkeley square traffic to a virtual standstill as the limos arrive.

Please don't get me started on the Morton's Disco (rave) which blasts nightclub level music in a tent in a wide open space and is unbearable.

Now you want to increase this? Really, what gain other than financial do you receive for an application such as this? To close a public space during the summer months? to prevent access from one side of the square to the other?

I can not see the proposed hours of the licensing and would appreciate those, but if anything is planned for the evening or weekends then the noise will echo around Berkeley Square, through Jones street and reverberate around Grosvenor Hill/Bourdon

Street like it always does during these events, which in the summer time leads to having to close windows to get any respite.

I strongly object to increased loss of a local amenity which is already oversubscribed in the summer months with people during the day and now you want to close off half?

Ola many people are concerned about this Berkeley square licence but there is only limited information accessible on the site. As councillor I am objecting to what appears to be a drinking and music licence on the grounds of public nuisance and probable public disorder. Please a knowledge this objection

It is not clear from the website what these licensable activities are. People have heard rumours of rock concerts.

I realise these events have happened before but what has happened is that the residents, who have been extremely patient, have watched the open spaces in the West End engulfed with commercial activity contrary to the London Squares Act. They are now fighting back. Even the maintenance argument does not hold water. The events create twice as much damage to the grass which has to put right as normal public use. We have to allow London to breathe and not regard it solely as a cash cow.

Whilst awaiting more details of the licensing application for the above I took these photos today, Sunday, of families, tourists and locals enjoying the peace and quiet of the square both to the North and the South. Such relaxing activities would no longer be possible if events are allowed there. It is clear it is fully in use as is and there is

absolutely no call to licence it for music and drinking indeed it would go completely against the purpose of a garden square.

Please add these observations to my submission and let me know the exact nature of the proposal because unless it maintains this much needed tranquillity in the centre of our busy town I maintain my objection



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Applicant Proposed Conditions

- 1. The licensee shall ensure that the Bandstand area and public space in the vicinity of the premises are kept free of litter from the premises at all material times to the satisfaction of the Council.
- 2. When there is a performance of concerts, at the Bandstand the highway in the vicinity of the premises shall be swept at regular intervals and at the close of business. All litter and sweepings collected and stored in the accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements. The Bandstand area is swept every evening prior to closing
- 3. The Licensee must ensure that the LAeq (5min) noise level does not exceed 70dB at the nearest affected premises during concert performances.
- 4. The following details must be provided to the Council's Environmental Health Consultation Team within a minimum of 28 days prior to the event day/s:
 - Onsite contact details for an appropriate person, in overall charge of the noise levels.
 - A running order of the proposed concerts that will be performed during the season.
- 5. Any special effects or mechanical installations shall be arranged and stored so as to minimise any risk to the safety of those using the premises. The following special effects will only be used upon 10 days prior written notice being given to the Licensing Authority and clearance by the London Fire and Emergency Planning Authority and the Environmental Health Consultation Team, Westminster City Council:

Dry ice and cryogenic fog Smoke Machines and fog generators Pyrotechnics including fireworks Lasers Strobe Lighting

- For all performances only hangings, curtains, upholstery and temporary decorations complying with the relevant British (or where appropriate European) Standard shall be used. Where necessary these shall be periodically tested for flame resistance and re-treated as necessary
- 7. The Licensee will comply with all reasonable requirements of the Environmental Health Consultation Team, Westminster City Council and the London Fire and Emergency Planning Authority

- 8. The Licensee shall ensure that all performers are issued with an Indemnity including all the conditions attached to the Premises Licence and, if relevant those agreed as a result of meetings with the Police and other agencies who have issues which need to be met.
- 9. The Bandstand changing area to comply with all issues relating to adequate Fire equipment, trained personal in the use of that equipment, and evacuation procedures. This to be verified by the local Fire Officer.
- 10. All Electrical equipment to be assessed by a competent person to comply with all current legislation for Health and Safety requirements.
- 11. Adequate medical and First Aid cover and facilities appropriate to the licensed area must be provided.
- 12. Adequate sanitary accommodation must be provided and maintained to serve the licensed event to the standards lay down by the Environmental Health Consultation Team. Onsite toilets for the performers in the Bandstand accommodation support this and Public Conveyances situated outside the park for the public, which is shown on the plan provided.
- 13. All gateways will be manned on performance times only. This is to facilitate emergency procedures with the public, to also maintain public safety, and to deal with incidents that may arise with the public.
- 14. No Alcohol is allowed into the Bandstand Auditorium during the concert performances.
- 15. The Licensee will comply with all reasonable requirements of the Environmental Health Consultation Team, Westminster City Council, The London Fire Brigade and Emergency Planning Authority, and the Metropolitan Police Service.
- 16. The duration of Live and Recorded Music shall not exceed a maximum of four hours in any giving day.
- 17. All events within the gardens shall comply with a set of standard conditions/permission letters for the use of the gardens, in addition to event specific conditions.
- 18. All statutory regulations and byelaws shall be covered within the standard conditions and regular advice and liaison will take place with the Environmental Health Service.
- 19. Consultation shall take place with local police, local businesses and communities in relation to event programme, timings and frequency.

- 20. All events shall be supervised and stewarded as according to the police and licensing requests.
- 21. Organiser shall supply an event safety plan, covering all aspects of health and safety, risk assessment, evacuation and first aid cover.

- 38. No non-emergency vehicles shall be operated within the premises during the event or when members of the public are on the premises.
- 39. The Licensee will ensure that risk assessments are produced for each event. These shall be made available to the Environmental Health Consultation Team upon request.
- 40. The Licensee must nominate one person for each event to act as safety coordinator. This information shall be made available to the Environmental Health Consultation Team.
- 41. An Event Management Plan shall be presented to the Responsible Authorities 28 days prior to an Event. This is to include:

All documentation required by the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974 relating to contractors and employees must be available for inspection by authorised officers at all times during the licensed event and must be kept at the location.



The Soho Society objects to this application as it is currently presented, on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder and cumulative impact in the West End Stress Area.

About The Soho Society

The Soho Society is a charitable company limited by guarantee established in 1972. The society is a recognised amenity group and was formed to make Soho a better place to live, work or visit by preserving and enhancing the area's existing diversity of character and uses, and by improving its facilities, amenities and environment. In particular, the society supports the Westminster City Council's policies, including the cumulative impact policy, as set out in the Statement of Licensing Policy.

Application summary

The application is described in Westminster Licensing News (1 March 2016 edition) as follows:

To permit the supply of alcohol for consumption without food on the premises until 20:00 on any day by waiter/waitress service to customer seated in the hatched areas, as shown on the plans submitted. This will be to no more than 10 persons in each designated area on each of the ground and first floor. Remove condition 27.

Increase in capacity of licensed premises in West End Cumulative Impact Area

The application seeks to increase in capacity at this venue within the West End Cumulative Impact Area. This is of particular concern as the sale of alcohol is proposed to be not ancillary to food. This application fails to promote the licensing objectives of prevention of crime and disorder, and public nuisance. Recent Metropolitan Police crime statistics show high levels of theft, theft from person, anti-social behaviour, drugs and sexual offenses in the area. There are private homes in nearby buildings, and residents in the immediate area are subject to noise and general nuisance every night of the week.

Licensing policy

This area has been identified by the Westminster City Council (2.4.1 of the Statement of Licensing Policy, as amended) as under stress because the cumulative effect of the concentration of late night and drink led premises and night cafes has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses.

The policies in relation to the stress areas are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (2.4.5 of the policy). The policies are intended to be strict and will only be overridden in genuinely exceptional circumstances (2.4.2 of the policy). The growth in the entertainment industry in Soho has led to a marked deterioration in the quality of life and well-being of local residents and it has jeopardised the sustainability of the community. Soho has a substantial residential community and many of these residents suffer from problems such as, but not limited to, high levels of noise nuisance, problems with waste, urinating and defecating in the streets, threats to public safety, anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder and the change in character of historic areas.

For the reasons I have set out, we believe that the application, if granted in its present form, would fail to promote the licensing objectives of prevention of public nuisance and prevention of crime and disorder. I respectfully urge the Licensing Sub-Committee to reject this application.

It is subject to other policies: this area is subject to seismic cumulative impact and is in the Westminster Stress Area.

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The application also states that Vinoteca wish to remove condition 27.

I object to this LIPV application.

Vinoteca, a licensed restaurant, is asking to serve 20 drinkers without food.

This Variation will increase the number of people consuming alcohol for a longer period which will add to existing cumulative impact.

Paragraph 2.4.4 of Westminster's statement of Licensing Policy states that a small increase in capacity in each premises would lead to a significant increase overall and that each incremental increase contributes in part to increasing the attraction of the area as a 'honey pot' destination for night life and to the cumulative problems created by such high concentration of activity in the area. The new Statement of Licensing policy states that restaurants must not add to cumulative impact and that the variations will only be granted if not contrary to other policies. It is subject to other policies: this area is subject to seismic cumulative impact and is in the Westminster Stress Area.

The new Statement of Licensing policy says clearly that this increase in cumulative impact will not be allowed. Westminster has already given Planning for 2 large new restaurants, one immediately opposite Vinoteca on Beak Street and one a hundred metres away on Marshall Street. Their impact is yet to be registered. The Statement further says that 'the consumption of alcohol is not and cannot become a significant part of the operation of the premises'. The proposal for 20 drinkers is higher than the request for 15 last year. This puts the number of drinkers to diners as 20 to 60.

The lower number 15 was a significant factor in the decision to refuse the application last year.

This area of Beak street is already saturated on weekends and getting this licence through would cause significant issues and nuisance.

' object as a similar application was rejected by the licensing committee last year and this new application requests more people able to drink without substantial meals (25% of the overall capacity). This does not appear to be in line with the recent policy considerations (The service of alcohol without food should not be a 'significant' part of the operation (para 2.4.21)).

The committee also rejected the previous application as it is clear from Vinoteca's other outlets and advertising that they operate as a wine bar, a wine retailer and provide meals. This site is licensed to operate as a restaurant, only providing alcohol to accompany substantial meals as part of the main meals at lunchtime and dinner (license condition paragraphs 12 and 27). I would be very concerned if the license were to be amended to soften this purpose given the cumulative impact in the area.

I would also argue that the creation of a seated bar area on bar stools and the offering of light meet or cheese platters on the menu is inconsistent with a restaurant operation and already is confusing for customers to understand whether this is a bone fide

restaurant or wine bar offering accompanying snacks.



CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a variation to a premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Conditions: On Current Licence -

Mandatory:

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979:
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Conditions reproducing the effect of conditions subject to which the relevant existing licences have effect

Conditions related to the Sale of Alcohol

- 9. Intoxicating liquor shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise than to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such a person as an ancillary to his meal.
- 10. Suitable beverages other than intoxicating liquor (including drinking water) shall be equally available with or otherwise as an ancillary to meals served in the licensed premises.

Conditions which reproduce the effect of any restriction imposed on these of the premises by specified enactments

Conditions related to the Sale of Alcohol

- 11. Alcohol may be sold or supplied:
 - (a) On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, Good Friday or New Year's Eve from 10:00 to 00:00.
 - (b) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, and on Good Friday: 12:00 to 23:30.
 - (c) On Christmas Day: 12:00 to 22:30;
 - (d) On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 10:00 to 23:00.
 - (e) On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12:00 to 22:30.
 - (f) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel:
- (b) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (c) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (d) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (e) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (f) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (g) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (h) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

- 12. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless the premises have been structurally and bona fide used, or intended to be used, for the purposes of habitually providing the customary main meal at midday or in the evening, or both, for the accommodation of persons frequenting the premises;
- 13. The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

- 14. The maximum number of persons accommodated at any one time shall not exceed (excluding staff):
 - Ground Floor 40 persons
 - First Floor 40 persons
- 15. The supply of alcohol on the premises shall only be by waiter or waitress service to persons seated at tables.
- 16. There shall be no supply of draught beer on the premises.

- 17. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 18. Clearly legible notices shall be displayed at all exits from the premises requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly.
- 19. No entertainment, performance, service, or exhibition involving nudity or sexual stimulation which would come within the definition of a sex establishment in Schedule 3 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 as amended by the Greater London Council (General Powers) Act 1986 (whether or not locally adopted), shall be provided.
- 20. No striptease, no nudity and all persons to be decently attired at all times.
- 21. All waste is to be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- The pavement from the building line to the kerb edge immediately outside the premises, including gutter/channel at its junction with the kerb edge, is swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements.
- 23. No rubbish including bottles will be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 20:00 hours and 08:00 hours.
- 24. No deliveries shall be made to the premises between the hours 20:00 hours and 08:00 hours.
- 25. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 26. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a Police or authorised council officer recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 27. The premises shall only operate as a restaurant (i) in which customers are shown to their table, (ii) which provide food in the form of substantial table meals that are prepared on the premises and are served and consumed at the table using non disposable crockery, (iii) which do not provide any take away service of food or drink for immediate consumption, and (iv) where intoxicating liquor shall not be sold, supplied, or consumed on the premises otherwise than to persons who are bona fide taking substantial table meals and provided always

that the consumption of intoxicating liquor by such persons is ancillary to taking such meals.


Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 28. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premise shall be in sealed containers only, shall be limited to wines and shall not be consumed on the premises.
- 29. There shall be no promotional sales of alcohol at the premises where alcohol is sold at a price lower that at which the same or similar alcoholic drinks are sold, or usually sold, on the premises.
- No super-strength beer, lager or ciders of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises.
- 31. There shall be no self service of spirits on the premise.
- 32. A log shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The log shall include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The log shall be available for inspection at the premises by the Police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open.
- 33. The primary use of the premises shall remain as a restaurant.
- 34. There shall be no sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 20:00 daily, with the exception of persons already seated and taking their table meal.

Conditions proposed by the applicant as part of the application

- 35. Notwithstanding condition 27, alcohol may be supplied to customers without food provided that
 - (a) Such supply shall only be to persons seated and served by waiter/waitress
 - (b) Such supply shall cease at 20:00
 - (c) Such supply shall be limited to 10 customers on the ground floor and 10 on the first floor to be seated on the area hatched black and shown on plan number

The availability of alcohol without food shall not be promoted or advertised otherwise than on menus and price lists within the premises.

I am writing to formally object to this Application for a New Premises Licence ref: 16/05415/LIPN for Unit 31/33, 3 Merchant Square, London W2.

My objection is made on the grounds of 'prevention of public nuisance'.

I have lived in a flat directly above this unit for 2 years and before that for 8 years directly opposite on the other side of the Canal for 8 years. I believe I know this new neighbourhood as well as anyone.

The fundamental problem with this application is the potential for noise (as well as smoking) directly or indirectly due to alcohol consumption. We are having continuing problems with Grand Union and Kupp both of which have a premises licence permitting sale of alcohol and late night refreshment. Grand Union's licence restricts all outside customers to be seated, and after 5pm alcohol is ancillary to food. Nevertheless, there are regularly 10-20 people standing outside the premises drinking and not eating or being seated. We have had the Enforcement section visit them last year but despite this they continue to be in breach of their planning permission (by having their customers outside the demise of of the permission) and of their Licensing conditions. I am in the process of Formally complaining to your department about these problems.

This is all relevant because the new application for Unit 31/33 is confusing in what is actually going to take place (inside and outside). The proposed conditions in Schedule A relating to the external area are somewhat confusing, and propose having customers outside standing and seating until 11pm, with no requirement for food. In fact, I note that the proposed schedule of conditions is very similar if not identical to the conditions on the Kupp premises licence. It should be noted that Kupp is not underneath a residential block.

Whatever is being asked it is of paramount importance, particularly in view of the continuing problems with Grand Union (and also in view of the recent restrictions prohibiting alcohol consumption at ANYTIME outside the premises of The Pavilion immediately opposite the side of Unit 31/33 only 15 feet away that your committee recently passed) that we do not allow a similar situation to be permitted here.

The Eastern End of this whole development -and that includes all the above premises-was designated by WCC as a residential area. There is no need for another drinking, and inevitably noise generating, premises here. The large amount of tall glass-fronted buildings means that noise is reflected and amplified. This is obviously a concern, particularly in the evening and night time.

It is unclear if indeed this will be a restaurant in view of the lack of conditions tying alcohol to food. Why is "late night refreshment" and "alcohol for consumption off the premises" being sought?

The tables and chairs outside are restricted to under the overhang of the building, according to the plans. However, I believe there is barely room for such tables let alone passage of serving staff. Tables and chairs outside could be used until 11pm each night, which is highly likely to cause a noise nuisance.

In summary I represent a number of the residents above this site and we believe strongly that there should be NO alcohol consumed outside at any time unless seated and accompanying food both being by waiter service. This would be in line with the Grand Union Licence and that recently granted to The Pavilion. Similarly Smoking must be in a controlled zone away from the flats immediately above.

Our comments are made as an Amenity Society recognised by Westminster City Council. We are officially charged with working towards the preservation and enhancement of the architectural and environmental quality of Little Venice, Maida Vale and the Paddington Waterway area (including planning and licensing issues). We are concerned with the well-being and sense of community of its residents, including those who live in the vicinity of Paddington Station and those who use the station either for travel or for passing through.

Introduction

We recognise that this proposal is designed to provide services for locals as well as people who are not residents in this area..

However, the application for on and off sales of alcohol raises a number of issues which lead us to conclude that it should be stringently conditioned.

Our representation is made on the basis that the likely impact of the application, if granted, would be to harm the licensing objectives of prevention of public nuisance. It could also impair the prevention of crime and disorder. We are also concerned about the impact of noise on children living in the immediate locale.

The operation is sited underneath residential accommodation in Merchant Square, below an overhang. Activities in it need careful regulation to minimise the disruption for neighbours in terms of noise and anti-social behaviour. It does not appear to be a restaurant in that the sale of alcohol is not ancillary to the purchase of food and we are concerned that this will just be another bar with vertical drinking. In any case, it falls under Policy PB1, so a lesser terminal hour should be granted due to the increased risk of public nuisance. Sales of alcohol (and the playing of music) until 23.30 Monday through Thursday and 00.00 Friday and Saturday seem too late.

We consider the application for Late Night Refreshment is inappropriate, given the location.

We would argue that drinking at tables and chairs outside until 11.00pm is unreasonable and that this activity should be terminated by 10.00pm.All sales of alcohol outside should be ancillary to food, waiter/waitress service only and patrons must be seated. There should be a limit on the numbers outside, in view of the close proximity to the residential block. This is unlike the situation for nearby café Krupp, which is not below residential.

Provision needs to be made to contain the impact of smoking on the nearby housing. We would like to know where smoking will be allowed, and how it would be policed.

We would ask that all patrons leaving are requested to do so quietly, and directed away in an appropriate direction, causing as little nuisance to the nearby residents as possible.

We would be very concerned about the emission of noise externally from the activities, particularly the varied types of music to be played and would seek reassurances, if not conditions on how this might be contained.

Alcohol is for consumption off premises too - we would ask why, and where?

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Mandatory Conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise):
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- Admission of children to the premises must be restricted in accordance with the film classification recommended by the British Board of Film Classification or recommended by this licensing authority as appropriate.
- 10 All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Proposed conditions by the Police and agreed with the applicant

- 11. Alcoholic drinks may not be removed from the premises in open containers save for consumption in external areas provided for that purpose.
- 12. Children under the age of 16 shall not be permitted to enter or remain at the premises after 22:00 unless they are dining with an adult or attending a pre booked function.
- 13. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
 - 14. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested
- 15. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an

authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:

- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
- (b) all ejections of patrons
- (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
- (d) any incidents of disorder
- (e) any faults in the CCTV system
- (f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- (g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
- A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open
- 17. Door supervisors will be employed by the Premises Licence Holder on a risk assessed basis. A suitable risk assessment will be undertaken and documented on a daily basis by the DPS, in relation to whether or not door supervisors are to be employed on specific occasions. On occasions when door supervisors are employed they shall display their SIA Licence at all times, worn with a high visibility arm band.
- 18. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- 19. All tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 22.00 each day.
- 20. Substantial food and suitable beverages other than intoxicating liquor shall be available during the whole of permitted hours in all parts of the premises where intoxicating liquor is sold and supplied.
- 21. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises after 22:00 hours, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
- 22. After 22.00hrs patrons permitted to temporarily leave and re-enter the premises shall be limited to 15 and those wishing to smoke shall be directed to the designated smoking area.
- 23. There shall be no take away of hot food or hot drink after 23.00 hours.
- 24. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 25. Clearly legible notices shall be displayed at all exits from the premises requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly.
- 26. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic

- identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- 27. During the Notting Hill Carnival, the following conditions will apply on Sunday and Monday of that weekend:
 - Drinks shall only be served in polycarbonate glasses
 There shall be no entry or re-entry to the premises after 20.30hrs



- 28. No customers carrying opened bottles of alcoholic drink upon entry shall be admitted to premises at anytime the premises are open to the public. (Agreed with EH)
- 29. It is considered that for the nature of the operation door supervisors will not be required however, the Designated Premises Supervisor will undertake a risk assessment should unusual events takes place and if they consider it appropriate will employ the same.
- 30. The layout of the licensed area both internally and externally as shown on the approved plan at the ground floor layout shall be substantially laid out for tables and chairs as indicated on the approved licensing drawing. (Agreed with EH)
- 31. There shall be no sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23.00 hours. (Agreed with EH)
- 32. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only, and shall not be consumed on the premises. (Agreed with EH)
- 33. After 23.00 hours the outside area shall only be used by patrons who have temporarily left the premises to smoke. (Agreed with EH)
- 34. No drinks shall be permitted to be taken outside after 23.00 hours. (Agreed with EH)
- 35. All external doors and windows shall be kept closed whilst regulated entertainment is taking place and in any case after 23:00 hours except for immediate access and egress of persons. (Agreed with EH)
- 36. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance. (Agreed with EH)
- 37. There shall be no regulated entertainment in the outside area.(Agreed with EH)
- 38. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance or exits areas or outside the premises building. (Agreed with EH)
- 39. There shall be no amplified live music. (Agreed with EH)
- 40. No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 2300 hours and 0800 hours. (Agreed with EH)
- 41. During the hours of operation, sufficient measures must be in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and the area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business. (Agreed with EH)

- 42. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order. (Agreed with EH)
- 43. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided. (Agreed with EH)

The venue is situated in the Queensway Cumulative Impact Area, a locality where there is traditionally high crime and disorder. We have concerns that this application will cause further policing problems in an already demanding area.

An officer from this unit will be in contact with you shortly to discuss the application. However it is for the applicant to prove that this application will not add to the cumulative impact problems already experienced in this area. It is for these reasons that we are objecting to the application.

We object to this application mainly on the grounds that hours of opening, sale of alcohol etc exceed the Councils 'Core Hours' especially as the premises are situated in the Queensway / Bayswater Stress area (or whatever new name is for this previous definition)

We are concerned as to potential problems in respect of loss of amenity (noise) and potential crime and disorder late at night .

We wish premises to operate as as a restaurant with alcohol ancillary to taking a substantial meal, seated with waiter/waitress service etc.

Tables and chairs outside should not be used after 23.00 hours - especially as residential units on second floor above premises.

We would like hours of use to follow planning permission on development (see below received from Oliver Gibson in North Team planning department at WCC) to be 23.30 (Sunday 22.30).

Customers shall not be permitted within the restaurant/ cafe units (Units 3 and 5) before 08.00 or after 23.30 Monday to Saturday (not including bank holidays and public holidays) and before 09.00 or after 22.30 on Sundays, bank holidays and public holidays.'

The retail shop unit also has an hours of use condition restricting the hours as follows:

'Customers shall not be permitted within the retail shop units (Units 1, 2, 4 and 6) before 07.00 or after 23.00 Monday to Saturday (not including bank holidays and public holidays) and before 10.00 or after 18.00 on Sundays, bank holidays and public holidays.'

The smaller of two units being combined into one does not have planning permission for A3 (restaurant use) and is designated as A1 (retail use) at present.

We note applicant has offered a number of 'model' conditions and trust they cover all of usual matters, CCTV, deliveries, hours of deliveries and refuse /recycling collections etc.

We also note applicant has applied for 'off sales and we want conditions that must be in sealed containers and no beer or cider over 5.5% alcohol strength.

the opening hours

the sale of alcohol during these opening hours

the lack of clarification regarding how alcohol will be sold (i.e. only with substantial meals)

Opening until midnight every week night and 11.30pm on Sundays will cause a great disturbance for the residents - particularly when clearing and cleaning the outside areas. It isn't fair for residents, who have bedroom windows directly above the proposed

outside area, to suffer extensive noise and nuisance at that time of night, I would like to object strongly to any outside tables as they will disturb residents all day, every day as well as every evening and weekend. I strong feel that the hours of sale be reduced to 10pm in line with the Waitrose hours of operation and that Sundays be restricted further.

The sale of alcohol from 10am until midnight every day and 11.30pm on Sundays is excessive. The area is already suffering from increased crime and disorder. There have recently been alcohol related muggings outside Arthur Court on Queensway, as well as my own vehicle broken in to by drunken youths. The Colonnades itself has been subject to crime committed by drunk individuals (a concrete brick through the glass door around the corner from this unit). The area suffers badly from homelessness and begging, which is often aggressive and drink-related. The police themselves have commented on another application for this building that they are already stretched in the area and feel further late license drinking establishments will worsen the situation.

The application gives very little indication of how alcohol will be served. My concerns above regarding crime and disorder, noise nuisance for neighbours and the public safety of the area equally apply to the way in which alcohol is served. We do not need another pub in the area and would like clarification on the service alcohol.

I'm a resident at Flat 135 The Colonnades which is one of 10 residential flats above the retail units.

I'm really excited by the updates to the building, the architects and planners have done a great a job.

I'm very concerned about what type of retail establishments will occupy the retail units.

My two main concerns are late night noise and heavy smoke.

The outdoor retail space is below a row of bedrooms which have windows facing Bishops Bridge Road. It is extremely important that no activity take place on the outdoor space after 10pm. The noise carries extremely easily and was a big headache for residents when the previous tenant occupied that space.

I'm happy for the restaurant to stay open till late but the outdoor patio space must not be used after 10pm. This should be a strict component of the license for the sake of neighbouring residents.

I'd also like to make sure that there will be no heavy smoking outside. Again this is

connected to the previous tenant which was a Hookah lounge/ sheesha cafe. The dense smoke carried straight into the bedroom and throughout the house.

With this being a Turkish restaurant I know that there is restaurant in soho from the same company which doesn't offer hookah pipes but I'd like to make sure that this place does not either.



BABAJI PIDE

Babaji is a contemporary restaurant and they are looking to open their second restaurant in Londonat the Bishops quarter site.

The first is located in the heart of London, near Piccadilly Circus, on Shaftesbury Avenue at the corner with Wardour Street. Pide, sometimes called 'Turkish pizza,' is a boat-shaped flat bread with a variety of toppings that may include ground lamb, or beef; 'Sucuklu,' with Turkish sausage (the 'c' is pronounced, 'j)'; or 'Peyniri', Black Sea-style, with lashings of butter and cheese. Seven kinds of pide are served from the brick oven that sits at the warm heart of Babaji.

Babaji is Alan Yau's response to the disappointment he felt upon trying pide, in London and Istanbul, and finding nothing special. "It seemed to me that nobody was taking particular pride in their pide," notes Mr Yau.

"Pide fascinates me from the point of view of its potential as a World Food. To have a global impact on food culture, the product has to be both sufficiently generic and at the same time it must have the capability of crossing cultural boundaries. I feel that pide has those attributes."

"In terms of the simplicity of the product, it has only two to three components; it's carbohydrate-based; it's extremely easy to replicate. I think those three criteria are most important to my definition of 'World Food,' a food product that has universal appeal. Here is something very close to a Pizza, but which sits in the middle of a very niche, extremely ethnic menu, that most people won't have heard of."

"The evolution of a World Food is a migratory process and there is no single example that achieved that status by staying at home. It requires a certain transformative evolution that comes from going out into the world." Karadeniz pide (Black Sea pide) was not widely available in Istanbul until the large scale migrations from the Black Sea in the 60's & 70's and, in fact, the most venerable Pide Salonu in Istanbul is only about 50 years old.

'Babaji' is the affection a Daddy's girl or boy has for their father, spelled 'babaçi' in Turkish, but pronounced, 'babaji'. Affable and avuncular types from the Mediterranean through to India are affectionately called, 'Babaji,' so the name, like the pide, crosses cultural boundaries.

Set out on the next few pages are the achievements of the operator and a small snapshot of the quality to expect.



THE DESIGN OF THE BABAJI

Turkish design studio Autoban, led by Seyhan Ozdemir and Sefer Caglar, has designed Babaji Pide Salonu from their office in Istanbul. It is the first restaurant they have created for Alan Yau, having built up a dialogue and mutual understanding over several years.

In the relatively short period since Autoban was founded in 2003, the studio has secured a strong reputation for its work across spectacular interiors, furniture, lighting and accessories. In many respects, Ozdemir and Caglar have invented a new image for Turkish design on the international stage, creating a design language that respects the traditions of their country in parallel with a strong contemporary vernacular. This approach makes Autoban a clear design partner for Yau, as they share many philosophies and ideals.



"We have always admired Yau's ability to mix the heritage of food with contemporary ideas," claims Ozdemir. Of course, Yau's vision to create a contemporary pide restaurant in the heart of London sparked the imagination of the design duo. "Alan first described his concept to us in 2011, and a few years later when he had secured this fantastic site, ideas in our heads started to become a reality."

CONDITIONS

CONDITIONS PROPOSED WITH APPLICATION

- 1. Non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available to patrons throughout the permitted hours for the sale or supply of alcohol.

 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.



If a licence for 'Off Sales' was to be granted we would want no more than WCC standard hours for Off Licences sales (or less ideally) and WCC 'model conditions' for:

CCTV; No beers & ciders over 5.5% alcohol volume; Lockable cabinets; All spirits to be sold only behind sales desk; No 'miniatures' of spirits; Challenge 25; No more than 10 % of sales area for display of alcohol; No deliveries between 20.00 & 0800 (Sundays & Bank Holidays 16.00 to 10.00); No Refuse and Recycling collections between 24.00 & 0700; Notices asking customers to leave quietly; No drinking on forecourt of shop; Licence holder to be on premises at all times.

We trust application will be refused.



- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.


- 9. A personal licence holder shall be on the premises during the hours permitted to supply alcohol.
- 10. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only, and shall not be consumed on the premises.
- 11. All tills shall automatically prompt staff to ask for age verification identification when presented with an alcohol sale.
- 12. Prominent signage indicating the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol shall be displayed so as to be visible before entering the premises, where alcohol is on public display, and at the point of sale.
- 13. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and leave the area quietly.
- 14. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 15. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 16. No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 2300 hours and 0800 hours.
- 17. A challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram
- 18. A diary log shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The log should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The log shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises are open.

19. The Licence will have no effect until the premises have been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team and this condition has been removed from the Licence.

Conditions proposed by the Police and agreed with applicant.

- 20. The premises shall install and maintain a CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Crime Prevention Officer. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises are open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 21. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to show Police or authorised officer of the Licensing Authority recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay.
- 22. Outside of the hours authorised for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area is to be secured behind locked grills/screens or secured behind locked cabinet doors.
- 23. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only, and shall not be consumed on the premises.
- 24. No super-strength beer, lagers or ciders of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises save for premium beer or ciders in glass bottles.
- 25. No more than 15% of the sales area to be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale or display of alcohol.
- 26. No self service of spirits except for spirit mixers not above 5.5% abv (alcohol by volume).
- 27. Prominent signage indicating the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol shall be displayed so as to be visible before entering the premises, where alcohol is on public display, and at the point of sale.
- 28. The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a

- holographic mark or other form of identification bearing the customer's photograph, date of birth and the proof of age standards scheme (or similarly accredited scheme) hologram.
- 29. An incident log will be kept at the premises and made available on request to an authorised officer of the licensing authority or the Police, which will record the following:
 - -All crimes reported to the venue;
 - -Any complaints received regarding crime and disorder;
 - -Any incidents of disorder;
 - -Any faults in the CCTV system;
 - -Any refusal of the sale of alcohol;
 - -Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 30. On the Sunday and Monday of the Notting Hill Carnival:
 - -There will be no sale of alcohol in glass vessels from the premises.
 - -There will be no external advertisement of alcohol promotions at the premises.
 - -There shall be no sale of alcohol from the premises after 20:00 hours.

I write to make a relevant representation to the above application on behalf of The Soho Society.

The Soho Society objects to this application as it is currently presented, on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder and cumulative impact in the West End Stress Area.

About The Soho Society

The Soho Society is a charitable company limited by guarantee established in 1972. The society is a recognised amenity group and was formed to make Soho a better place to live, work or visit by preserving and enhancing the area's existing diversity of character and uses, and by improving its facilities, amenities and environment. In particular, the society supports the Westminster City Council's policies, including the cumulative impact policy, as set out in the Statement of Licensing Policy.

Application summary

New licensed premises in the West End Cumulative Impact Area

The proposal is for a new licensed premises situated at the heart of the West End Cumulative Impact Area, on a street that includes a large number of private residences. The new Sale by Retail of Alcohol licensable activity is of particular concern, with reference to Westminster City Council stress area and cumulative impact policy. Such new licences should be prohibited. These venues destroy residential amenity over a wide area through noise nuisance as patrons disperse. We note with concern that such a licence could be given to an A1 bubble tea establishment, which (i) is not in accordance with licensing objectives, and (ii) already has plenty of licensed premises in the immediate vicinity (i.e. next-but-one to The White Horse pub on the left, four doors down from The Yard bar on the right, and opposite the Rupert Street bar - all three of which are busy venues).

Licensing policy

This area has been identified by the Westminster City Council (2.4.1 of the Statement of Licensing Policy, as amended) as under stress because the cumulative effect of the concentration of late night and drink led premises and night cafes has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses.

The policies in relation to the stress areas are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (2.4.5 of the policy). The policies are intended to be strict and will only be overridden in genuinely exceptional circumstances (2.4.2 of the policy). The growth in the entertainment industry in Soho has led to a marked deterioration in the quality of life and well-being of local residents and it has jeopardised the sustainability of the community. Soho has a substantial residential community and many of these residents suffer from problems such as, but not limited to, high levels of noise nuisance, problems with waste, urinating and defecating in the streets, threats to public safety, anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder and the change in character of historic areas. For the reasons I have set out, we believe that the application, if granted in its present form, would fail to promote the licensing objectives of prevention of public nuisance and prevention of crime and disorder. I respectfully urge the Licensing Sub-Committee to reject this application.

Please let me know if any proposals are made to amend the application; particularly in respect of the hours sought or any further conditions proposed.



- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.


- 9. The supply of alcohol shall be limited to a single spirit measure of 25ml or less in a 500ml serving of tea.
- 10. The supply of alcohol on the premises shall only be for consumption by persons who are seated.
- 11. The supply of alcohol shall be limited to spirits only.
- 12. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after **23:00** hours, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- 13. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- 14. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
- During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.

- 16. No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 07.00 on the following day.
- 17. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 18. The number of persons seated permitted in the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 20.
- 19. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 20. No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until the premises has been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team at which time this condition shall be removed from the Licence by the licensing authority.

Conditions proposed by the Police

- 21. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 22. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 23. No drinks shall be served in glass containers at any time.
- 24. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 25. All tills shall automatically prompt staff to ask for age verification identification when presented with an alcohol sale.
- 26. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
- 27. A Challenge 21 or Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.

- 28. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
- 29. The licensable activities authorised by this licence and provided at the premises shall be ancillary to the main function of the premises as a Bubble Tea Store and limited to Bubble Tea products.







CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Mandatory Conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979:
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol:
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the

- permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.


Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 9. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- 10. All tables and chairs shall be removed from the outside area by 23.00 hours each day.
- 11. A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open.
- 12. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 13. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.

Conditions proposed by the Police and agreed by the applicant

- 14. The premises shall operate as a cake shop and tea rooms:
 - (i) in which customers are shown to their table
 - (ii) where the supply of alcohol is by waiter or waitress service only
 - (iii) where alcohol shall not be sold or supplied for consumption on the premises otherwise than by persons who are seated in the premises and where the consumption of alcohol by such persons is ancillary to food (including cake, desserts and ice cream)
 - (iv) where all sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be for consumption by persons who are seated immediately outside the premises, tables and chairs that are licensed by the Council and where the consumption of alcohol by such persons is ancillary to food (including cake, desserts and ice cream).
- 15. No beer, lager or cider shall be sold from the premises.
- 16. The number of persons permitted in the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 60 persons.
