## 2. SUMMARY OF APPLICATION

- 2.1 An application has been submitted by PC Cheryl Boon on behalf of the Metropolitan Police Service, a Responsible Authority, for a review of the premises licence for London Late Club, 28a Leicester Square, London, WC2H 7LE. This application was received on 13 December 2018 on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder. A full copy of the application can be found at **Appendix 1**.
- 2.2 Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (para 11.2) states that at any stage following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority, such as the Police or the Environmental Health Service, or any other person who can seek a review, may ask the Licensing Authority to review the premises licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.
- 2.3 As such, in accordance with section 52(2) of the above-mentioned Act, the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to consider the application and any relevant representations.
- 2.4 The premises currently benefits from a premises licence that permits:

**Performance of Dance, Performance of Live Music, Anything of a similar description to Live Music, Recorded Music or Performance of Dance**

- 2.5 These review proceedings are brought under the licensing objectives on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder. Further documents that were submitted as part of the review application can be found at **Appendix 1**.
- 2.6 On submission of this application, the applicant provided an in-depth description of the issues relating to the premises which stated the following:
- On Sunday 7 October 2018, Police were called to the premises to a report of a large fight at the location.
  - Upon arrival, Officers on the scene described numerous males and females fighting and that the premises security were doing very little to intervene or assist. 14 Police officers attended the scene to assist with trying to gain some order to this incident and to allow a large volatile crowd to disperse.
  - Police on scene reported how unhelpful both management and security were at the venue.
  - Venue management made the decision to try and stop the disorder inside by closing the venue which lead to what Police encountered outside the venue.
  - From viewing CCTV footage and further enquiries, it was discovered that there had been a large violent disorder inside the premises.
  - From CCTV to begin with there is some form of management by the security but they have lost all control of the venue resulting in little or no supervision by them and the fighting that ensued.
  - From CCTV footage, Police reported that this was one of the worst incidents of disorder in Westminster that has been seen within a licensed premises.
  - Neighbours of this premises, Global, have explained that London Late Club had allowed its patrons to exit the premises via Global's emergency escape route resulting



in Global's security having to deal with customers who were trying to gain entrance into their building.

- It is believed that if the premises were to continue trading as per its current licence there could be potential for further crime and disorder to take place.
- From Police evidence and CCTV, large scale disorder is seen to take place which cannot be contained or managed by the venue.

2.7 A copy of the existing Premises Licence (18/02327/LIPDPS) is attached at **Appendix 2**.

2.8 It should be noted that on 16 November 2018 an application was submitted to the Licensing Service to transfer the premises licence from Traditek Limited to West End Property Company Limited. An objection was received to this transfer application from the Metropolitan Police Service and it is still to be determined.

2.9 On 11 December 2018 an application was submitted to the Licensing Service to transfer the premises licence from West End Property Company Limited to London Property Company Limited. An objection was received to this transfer application from the Metropolitan Police Service and it still to be determined.

### **3. REPRESENTATIONS:**

3.1 On 8 January 2019, Environmental Health submitted a representation to the application in support of the review application as the operation of the premises raises serious Public Safety concerns as well as the Crime and Disorder issues highlighted by the Metropolitan Police Service. A copy of this representation can be found at **Appendix 4**.

### **4. OPTIONS:**

3.1 The applicant is seeking revocation of the premises licence.

3.2 The Authority must, having regard to the application and the representations, take such steps (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

- (a) to modify the conditions of the licence;
- (b) to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
- (c) to remove the designated premises supervisor;
- (d) to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
- (e) to revoke the licence;

and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition added.

3.3 In accordance with section 52(6) of the 2003 Act, if the authority takes measures to modify conditions or exclude licensable activities from the licence, it may stipulate that the modification or exclusion is to have effect for only such period (not exceeding three months) as it may specify.

3.4 The licensing authority's determination of this application does not have effect until the 21 day appeal period has expired or if the decision is appealed the date the appeal is determined and / or disposed of.

## PROTECTIVE MARKING

At approximately 0345hrs on Sunday 7th October 2018 police were called to London Late Club, 28A Leicester Square, WC2H 7LE to a report of a large fight at the location.

Upon police arrival they were met with a very confused scene with between 80 to 100 people out the front of the premises in Leicester Square, officers on scene describe how there were numerous males and females fighting each other and that the premises security were doing very little to intervene or assist. It took 14 Police officers to attend the scene and assist with trying to gain some order to this incident and to allow the large volatile crowd to disperse.

Once this initial fighting has abated officers tried to make enquiries with management and security to ascertain exactly what had happened, there was one male detained but no victims came forward and Police were informed from witnesses that he was in fact a victim of this disorder. Police located three victims outside the premises, it would appear that one was a member of security team and two were customers of the venue, their injuries all required medical treatment from the London Ambulance Service and the member of security team was taken to St Thomas' Hospital. Police on scene reported how unhelpful both management and security were at the venue and that the majority of customers that they tried to speak to were anti-police and refused to provide any details including the other two victims.

Venue management made the decision to try and stop this disorder inside by closing the venue. Which therefore lead to what police encountered outside the venue. It has been subsequently discovered from further enquiries and by viewing the CCTV that there has been a large violent disorder inside the venue. This CCTV shows in the main area of the premises a scuffle beginning, security begin ejecting customers this then quickly escalates into different groups fighting, they are seen to throw objects at each other, punch each other and at one point a male is repeatedly stamped on whilst lying on the floor. At least 20 separate people are seen to be involved in this. People are allowed access to the empty bottle store where they select these bottles and try and arm themselves with them. From CCTV to begin with there is some form of management by the security but they have lost all control of the venue resulting in little or no supervision by them and the fighting that ensues. From CCTV this is one of the worse incidents of disorder in Westminster that has been seen within Licensed premises.

Contact has been made with Westminster Council Licensing services and subsequently Westminster Police licensing by representatives of the neighbours of this premises, Global. They have explained how the club has allowed its patrons to exit via Global's emergency escape route, therefore resulting in their security having to deal with these customers who were trying to gain entrance further into their building. One male is seen leaving this area with a white shirt on which is covered in blood. There are blood smears and stains left on walls and railings within Global. This has therefore caused a strain and nuisance on a neighbouring business and has left damage within their premises that they have had to rectify. CCTV and stills provided of this. This exit via Global goes out onto Charring Cross Road, at least 30 customers left via this exit and it is believed that the number of injured people is in excess of the 3 that police found on the Leicester Square exit as besides the male with covered in blood, another male can be seen to be limping and another holding his side.

Police and Westminster City Council City Inspectors had already prior to this incident been trying to liaise with the management regarding concerns that were raised from earlier visits to the premises.

It is believed that if the premises were to continue trading as per its current licence there could be more potential for further crime and disorder to take place, it is evidenced here that the venue was not equipped to prevent this from happening or to deal with what it was confronted with during the incident.

After the incident Police Licensing Team have met with representatives from the venue to discuss this incident. The venue have stated that they were removing their existing management team and the only person remaining to be a back of house employee Saeed AZIMI. This in itself has caused issues as a further meeting was held with AZIMI and a new Designated Premises Supervisor was put forward to Police and a new business model suggested with proposed new conditions as to which to operate under. It was suggested that the Licence Holders could not make this meeting as they were out of the country. It would transpire that Saeed AZIMI did not have the authority with Traditek to employ this DPS or to suggest this new idea. Police have therefore tried to contact the Licence Holders, Traditek via their Accountant but again have not been provided with any contact details for them. Therefore it is unknown what will happen to this licence as the premises Licence Holders will not meet with Police to discuss this large scale disorder or any future changes to the venue moving forward, therefore it is a high risk to continue to allow them to trade as is currently available to them.

Further to this it has now come to light via Orbit who are the Landlord for the premises that they have not been paying their rent and they have therefore forfeited their lease. There is a dispute between Traditek and Orbit over who now owns this Premises Licence as Orbit believe this is a clause in their Lease which if the lease is forfeited then they automatically take ownership of this Licence. They have also requested two recent Licence transfers, the final one being transferred to London Property Company Limited. This has therefore lead to more uncertainty as to who will be operating this licence and how this will be achieved.

Westminster Police Licensing have called this review and request that the Premises Licence be revoked in order to uphold the Licensing Objective relating to the prevention of crime and disorder. From police evidence and CCTV large scale disorder is seen to take place which can not be contained or managed by the venue.

Decision (including reasons if different from those set out in report):

The Presenting Officer introduced the nature of the application, which was for a new licence for the Premises to continue operating as a Bar and Nightclub. The



Premises had the benefit of a current licence, which had been granted in September 2005. An application to transfer the existing licence to the West End Property Company Limited had been refused by the City Council, as the former tenants who held that licence had refused to give their consent. The landlord's only option had accordingly been to apply for a new Premises Licence. Although the application was being made for the same licensable activities and terms as the current licence, it was accepted and agreed that the conditions were being updated in line with the model conditions. Further conditions were also being offered following consultation with the Police and other Responsible Authorities, regarding door supervisors and the use of polycarbonate drinking vessels. No residential representations had been received in response to the proposed application.

Ms Sharkey addressed the Sub-Committee on behalf of the Applicant, and confirmed that the venue was to operate on a hybrid basis that would provide food, drinks and dancing as part of an evening's entertainment. The plan included in the current application had been updated to include information on fire safety, and Ms Sharkey confirmed that if the application was to be granted, a full plan for the proposed operation of the Premises would be submitted as part of any minor variation.

Ms Sharkey commented on the representation made by the Licensing Authority, and confirmed that the proposed licence conditions would require that all people who entered the Premises after 23:00 would have their ID scanned. The Applicant considered that the Challenge 21 entry scheme would be appropriate, as there had been no previous history of under-age entry at the premises. With regard to the proposed condition relating to the use of polycarbonate drinking vessels, the Applicant had proposed an alternative condition that would provide some flexibility for the provision of glassware for drinks such as champagne or cocktails.

Mr Payne described the operation of other establishments currently run by the operator, such as Gilgamesh and Shaka Zulu in Camden, which offered a combined food and dance 'vibe dining' experience similar to that proposed for the premises in Leicester Square. Mr Payne considered that the earlier opening hour together with the element of the proposal which did not include dancing could enable flexibility over the use of polycarbonate later in the evening.

Ms Sharkey referred to the judgement made in the case between **Novus Leisure and Westminster City Council**, which determined that although existing licensable activities could be lost when the present operator became unable to operate the licence, it did not prevent occupancy levels or licensable activities being raised in any application for a new premises licence or variation. On this basis, the Applicant asked the Sub-Committee to take the licensing activities contained in the previous licence into account when determining the current application. The Applicant confirmed that a commitment would be given to not seek to make use of the previous licence, should the current application be granted.

Following consultation with the Police the Applicant had agreed a number of



proposed conditions, but had not approved a Police request for a reduction in permitted hours and entertainment. Although it was acknowledged that there had been incidents at the Premises under the previous operator, the Applicant sought to maintain the hours that had been granted under the previous licence with an earlier time for last entry of 02:00. The Applicant considered that the new licence offered a significant improvement on that previously granted, and would include all of the conditions that would be expected for a late night operation, such as door staff numbers and the requirements for searches to be undertaken.

PC Russell commented that although the Applicant had a good reputation, future operators could be different and this needed to be taken into account. Crime levels during the previous operation of the Premises had been high, and the Sub-Committee noted that the Police would have sought a review of the operator's licence had the Premises not closed. A reduction in operating hours had accordingly been sought to reduce the possibility of crime which had related to the premises re-occurring in the future.

The Police also sought clarification of how the transition for the proposed transition from glass drinking vessels to polycarbonate during the evening would take place, and the Applicant confirmed that the timing, arrangements and incentives would be the same as those that had been successfully operating at other venues.

Mr Watson confirmed that although Environmental Health had made no representations regarding the proposed operation of the Premises, they were concerned over possible off-sales. The Sub-Committee noted that while off-sales had not been included in the application, customers would be able to take unfinished drinks away from the Premises up until 23:00 hours. The Sub-Committee also acknowledged that the public consultation had only been for on-sales at the premises.

Mr Sycamore outlined the views of the Licensing Authority, which had worked closely with the Applicant in seeking to make the Premises a safer establishment. Although the agreed conditions were seen as improvements, the application remained against Policy as the Premises were located within the West End Cumulative Impact Area.

The Policy Advisor informed the Sub-Committee that the application would need to be determined on its merits as a new application within the Cumulative Impact Area, and that it could be considered that granting a new licence on similar terms to that which was still in effect would not make a further contribution to cumulative impact. The likelihood of a review of the previous operator could also be taken into account in deciding whether the current application was a departure from Policy and could be granted.

Ms Sharkey confirmed that if the application was to be refused, the Applicant would be guided back to obtaining the existing licence.

The Sub-Committee acknowledged that it was likely that any new application would be against Policy and not be granted, as the Premises were within the



	<p>West End Cumulative Impact Area. It was also probable that the previous licence would have been subject to review, due to the crime and disorder that had occurred in connection with the Premises. However, based on the commitments to the new model of operation that had been given by the Applicant in oral submissions, together with a firm undertaking that the Applicant would not take advantage of the existing licence, the Sub-Committee considered the application to be an exception to Policy. In view of the new operating model of 'vibe-dining' with substantial food during the day and at night-time, the application was granted subject to conditions. In determining the matter, the Sub-Committee considered that the conditions imposed on the Premises Licence are appropriate and proportionate.</p>

    - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a



licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
  - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
  - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
7. The responsible person must ensure that—
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
  - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of



the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.



9. Prior to 23:00 customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
10. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
11. The number of persons permitted on the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 235 persons.
12. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
13. There shall be a Personal Licence Holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
14. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all other persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
15. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
16. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
17. The consumption of alcohol on the premises shall cease 30 minutes after the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol.
18. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
19. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised Officer of the City Council or Police and will record the following:
  - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
  - (b) all ejections of patrons
  - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
  - (d) any incidents of disorder
  - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
  - (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment
  - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency serviceIt must be completed before the end of the trading session.

  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
  - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

8.
  - (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
  - (ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
    - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
    - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -
 
$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

      - (i) P is the permitted price,
      - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
      - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
    - (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
      - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
      - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or



- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
  - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
  - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv).
  - (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
  - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### **Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority**

9. Prior to 23:00 customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
10. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
11. The number of persons permitted on the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 235 persons.
12. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
13. There shall be a Personal Licence Holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
14. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all other persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
15. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
16. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
17. The consumption of alcohol on the premises shall cease 30 minutes after the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol.
18. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
19. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised session and will record the following:
  - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
  - (b) all ejections of patrons
  - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
  - (d) any incidents of disorder
  - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
  - (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment
  - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
21. After 23:00 hours, there should be no consumption of drinks (excluding hot drinks) from vessels other than polycarbonate vessels. This condition shall not apply to the serving and consumption of wine, sparkling wine, spirits or champagne bottles with a minimum size of 70cl and champagne flutes supplied by waiter/waitress service to tables. Staff shall clear all empty wine, spirit and champagne bottles promptly from



the tables. Customers shall not be permitted to leave their table carrying any such glass bottles or drink directly from the bottle.

22. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
23. After 23:00 hours, all customers entering the premises will have their 1D scanned on entry.
24. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
25. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
26. All emergency exit doors shall be available at all material times without the use of key, code, card or similar means.
27. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
28. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.
29. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
30. All fabrics, curtains, drapes and similar features including materials used in finishing and furnishing shall be either non-combustible or be durably or inherently flame-retarded fabric. Any fabrics used in escape routes (other than foyers), entertainment areas or function rooms, shall be non-combustible.
31. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport, proof of age card with the PASS Hologram or Military ID card.
32. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
33. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
34. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
35. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
36. No collections of waste or recycling materials (including bottles) from the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day.
37. From 21:00 hours, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), a minimum of 2 SIA door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises. A minimum of one shall be deployed at



the entrance and shall wear a Body Worn Video Camera. Additional door supervisors shall be employed as determined by a documented management risk assessment taking cognizance of police advice of 1 SIA per 100 customers before 23.00hrs and 1 SIA per 50 customers thereafter, (or such other advice as may be given from time to time). At all times from 23:00 hours, 2 door supervisors shall be deployed at the entrance. The risk assessment to be made available upon request.

38. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system (including where applicable any Body Worn Video system) shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
39. A minimum of 5 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises from 23.00hrs to close 7 days per week. A minimum of 2 on the entrance and 3 inside the premises (This is still subject to discussion based on what the premises is to become) Prior to this time door staff numbers will be at least a 1:100 ratio unless decided otherwise by a risk assessment conducted by a member of the venue's management team.
40. At least 2 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business. A minimum of one to be wearing Body Worn Video throughout trading times and for 30 minutes after closing whilst dispersing
41. After 21.00hrs any persons entering or re-entering the premises shall be searched by a SIA licensed member of staff and monitored by the premises CCTV system. Search wands will be used during all searches.
42. Body worn video systems used by the premises must be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of staff
43. All staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure they are confident it's use. A record will be kept on the premises of which staff have been trained. This record will be available to the relevant authority for inspection upon request
44. Where the premises are operating for a specific pre-booked event or occasion when a guest list is in operation, only a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager will be authorised to add additional names to the guest list. Any additions less than 48 hours before the pre-booked event or occasion must be legibly entered on the list and signed for by a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager. The list will be kept for a period of 31 days following the event and will be made available immediately for inspection upon the request by a Police Officer or Council Officer.
45. After 21:00, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), all security engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high visibility yellow jackets or vests.
46. All externally promoted events held at the venue shall be notified to the Metropolitan Police Service. A form 696 will be completed and submitted within 14 days prior to the event, or such less time as agreed with the Police. When carrying out the risk assessment for the event and holding the event the venue will take into account any reasonable advice received from the Westminster Police Licensing Team and the central Clubs/Promoters Police Team who receive the form 696 (or their equivalent) and upon a reasonable request by Police the venue will not run the event.



47. After 23:00 hours, or such earlier time as deemed necessary following risk assessment, a search policy shall be implemented of customers entering the premises. Such policy to be documented having regard to police advice and shall be made available upon request.
48. a) From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing.
- b) All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- c) A Body worn video system shall be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of door staff.
- d) All door staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure that they are confident in its use. A record shall be kept on the premises of which door staff have been trained. This record will be available to the Police or Licensing Authority for inspection upon request.
49. There shall be no admittance or re-admittance to the premises after 02:00 except for patrons permitted to temporarily leave the premises to smoke.



I currently work as a Police Constable as part of the Westminster Police Licensing Team as part of my role I deal with Licensed premises and crimes that take place within venues and deal with these offences accordingly. On the morning of Monday 8<sup>th</sup> October 2018 I was made aware of an offence of violent disorder that had taken place at LONDON LATE CLUB, 28A LEICESTER SQUARE, WC2H 7LE at approx. 0345hrs on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2018. I had previously dealings with the operators of this business and their Licensing Solicitor Robert Sutherland from Keystone Law. To begin with I have attempted to contact the manager who I have spoken to before, a male who identified himself to me as Ronnie (Hasheem HOSSEINI) by sending him an email. I have then seen from the Cris report 6550461/18 that Prakash KHATRI the Designated Premises supervisor had been present during the incident I have therefore sent him an email, both emails to request a meeting at the premises to try and ascertain exactly what had happened and view CCTV and Body Worn Video of the incident. When I have not received a reply to either emails I have called Prakash KHATRI on his mobile telephone. I have arranged a meeting with him at the venue on 11/10/18, however their licensing solicitor Robert Sutherland was unable to make it, it has therefore been rescheduled for 12/10/18 at 1500hrs.

In the meantime it has come to my attention via an email sent to Westminster City Council Licensing Service that a complaint had been made from a neighbouring business to LLC, this being Global at 29-30 Leicester Square. This was stating that after the above mentioned incident the customers had left the venue via the fire exit that goes through Global, this has lead to blood smears being left on the wall and furniture within this premises and their lone security personnel having to deal with these people. At approximately 1530hrs on 11/10/18 I have attended Global with PC Deweltz, we have spoken to Alison Jannegren and Imran Majid. They explained how they had on going issues with this premises, they have used their

fire exit as a means of escape previously as they have raised these issues with them regarding their apparent lack of management. They have also contacted the Landlords of this building Orbit Property regarding these on going issues. They have provided us with stills of this incident and completed copy of CCTV. It appears as though at least 30 people have exited via this rear fire escape which leads onto Charing Cross Road, it is unclear if any of these people were spoken to by Police or just dispersed naturally but at least two of them appeared to be injured, one male is covered in blood on his upper torso, another is seen limping as he is exiting the premises.

At approximately 1130hrs on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> October 2018 I have sent an email to Peter CHAPMAN who is a director for Orbit Property management who are the landlords for 28A Leicester Square to make him aware of our concerns as to the large scale disorder as described by Police that attended and to ask him for assistance if required when dealing with the management of LLC.

At approximately 1430hrs on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> October 2018 myself and PC Deweltz have attended Global and collected the CCTV they had from this incident. From here we have gone onto LLC, where a meeting has been held. We began by chatting to the following people present Ronnie HOSSEINI (Hasheem) – General manager, Prakash KHATRI – DPS, Andra ANDREAPOLUS – Assistant General Manager, Saeed HOSSEINI, Dougie THOMPSON – PSS (security), Robert SUTHERLAND – Solicitor acting for the premises License Holder, Traditek Limited. I have made minutes of this meeting which I can exhibit as CB/1, these minutes were made at approx. 1802hrs on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> October 2018. During this meeting it has been made clear to the representatives that we had no faith in the running of the business and that we would like to it voluntarily close so that they could decide on a new business model but not a night club with night club trading hours. We discussed the failings of the venue. The management have questioned the amount of time Police took to respond to their 999 call made by Andra, I had a copy of the cad 1272 7OCT18 with me so I have checked this and it shows that police arrived 3 minutes after their call not 15 minutes as stated by them.

The CCTV was viewed with the assistance of Andra ANDREAPOLUS, this CCTV shows in the main area of the premises a scuffle beginning, security begin ejecting customers this then quickly escalates into different groups fighting, they are seen to throw objects at each other, including ice buckets. Punch each other and at one point a male is repeatedly stamped on whilst lying on the floor. At least 20 separate people are seen to be involved in this. People are allowed access to the fire exit via an empty bottle store where they select these bottles and try and arm themselves with them, one male is seen to be hit over the head by one of these bottles. From CCTV to begin with there is some form of management by the security but they have

lost all control of the venue resulting in little or no supervision by them and the fighting that ensues. This large scale disorder involves at least 20 people you can see different fights in different locations, people using what ever they can get hold as weapons that are being thrown around the venue. Through this incident management have made the decision to turn on the lights and stop the music, customers have been seen to gradually leave the venue via the main exit on Leicester Square and into the fire exit onto Charing Cross Road. I have been a Police Officer for approximately thirteen years and this is the worse footage I have seen of disorder within a licensed premises. We requested that the venue provide us with a copy of CCTV to cover all cameras that the premises have, all Body Worn Video footage and all details of the ID scan for the suspects involved and that it be completed as soon as possible.


After the this meeting an email was received from Robert SUTHERLAND stating that the premises would close voluntarily and that they would be in contact with the Police Licensing team with a proposal for a new venture.

On going enquiries into the management of the venue revealed that there was also another party involved Eli (Saeed) AZIMI and from Cris checks it would appear as though he is the brother of Hasheem HOSSEINI and Saeed HOSSEINI. I was informed by my colleagues that Eli AZIMI use to be the Designated Premises Supervisor for Avalon Nightclub which under his management there was a fatal shooting within the venue. Therefore this raised further concerns with regards to the management of this venue.

Therefore a further meeting was called via Robert Sutherland at Portland House, Bressenden Place at approximately 1230hrs on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> October 2018 as Police Licensing did not want them to start trading again in the same manner. In attendance this time was Eli AZIMI, Robert SUTHERLAND, James HOFFELNER (new proposed DPS) and Tony NASH from MLB security. Present from Police licensing were PS WHITELEY, PC DEWELTZ, PC GUERRA and myself.

James HOFFELNER explained how the only remaining member of staff was Eli AZIMI and possibly Andra ANDREAPOLUS, they were adamant that AZIMI is in no way front of house and is purely the technical background role and that he will remain in this role with the new business venture and that ANDREAPOLUS would remain as AGM.

They have then began promoting their new idea as a concept bar focusing on beer pong. They would use them same format as a bar that AZIMI is the DPS for, this being SINK PONG. They stated that they did not want it to become a nightclub. It has been reiterated by Police licensing that the hours would need to be decreased as currently they can trade until 0600hrs. It

was also discussed the idea of creating a condition stating that entry to the premises would be ancillary to beer pong and be pre-booked. During this meeting it was discussed the managements failure in providing police with any CCTV footage, PC DEWELTZ had collected CCTV that contained a TV show and private documents on it. They apologised for this and stated they would rectify this ASAP. I made minutes of this meeting and exhibit this document as CB/2.

On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> October 2018 a USB stick containing CCTV was delivered to the Police Licensing offices. I have began viewing this CCTV to check that it was all there. I found that I only had footage of 15 cameras and one camera that had been left out was that in the empty bottle store. I have therefore immediately emailed Robert SUTHERLAND requesting footage for the all the cameras as originally requested. I received a reply informing us that his client is having difficulties with access to the venue and that he would keep us updated with any further developments.

Due to this information I have sent a further email to Peter CHAPMAN of Orbit Property management asking him to clarify that it was the case that they could not gain access to the premises. I also asked for confirmation of a date when we might be able to gain access to the premises again due to seize the remaining CCTV. Further correspondence with Orbit lead PC DEWELTZ and PC HUNTER attending the venue with Orbit. I can provide my correspondence with Orbit as CB/3.

It has subsequently come to light that Eli AZIMI did not have the permission from Traditek to suggest the beer pong idea. Enquiries have been done to try and contact Traditek through there accountant and solicitor but so far they have failed to make any attempt to engage with Police. This company have shown any lack of promoting their Licensing objective with regards to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, they firstly allowed this large scale disorder to take place where an unknown amount of people were injured. Since this incident they have failed to engage with Police and have been chased up in order to provide CCTV, Body Worn Video footage or copies of ID scans, therefore not assisting in an investigation. Therefore it is felt that there is no option left but to seek for full revocation of this premises License. *C. Mizer*



My name is Adam Deweltz and I am a Police Constable for the Metropolitan Police Service. I have been a Police Officer for 17 years and I am an experienced licensing officer currently working in the Westminster Police Licensing Unit. I have been in this role since November 2014. Since then I have dealt with a wide range of licensing matters including applications for new premises licences, licence committee hearings, licence review hearings and a large number of licensing visits to a variety of licensed premises within the City Of Westminster. My unit is responsible for approximately 3,500 licensed premises in Westminster. When visiting these licensed premises the aim is to work in partnership with them by making improvements and offering advice to ensure the licensing objectives are achieved.

I submit the below information in regard to an application by the Westminster Police Licensing Unit, on behalf of the Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, to review the premises Licence of London Late Club (LLC), 28A Leicester Square, London, WC2H 7LE. Premises licence number 18/02327/LIPDPS.

The Westminster Police Licensing Unit seeks revocation of the premises licence on the grounds of Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Safety. On Sunday 7th October 2018 at approximately 03:45 hours, serious crime and disorder took place at London Late Club. This resulted in 14 Police Officers being deployed to the venue and The London Ambulance Service being utilised. A door supervisor was conveyed to St Thomas Hospital for treatment who suffered from a deep laceration to his head. This is believed to have been caused by a bottle inside the venue.

Other individuals who had attended the venue as customers also had injuries and they were treated at the scene. All individuals involved in this incident refused to engage with Police after.

It is unknown what started the fight. However CCTV enquiries show an altercation start between people from two separate groups. This altercation then spirals out of control and the people start punching and fighting with each other. This then leads to full scale disorder with up to 20+ people fighting. Various articles found in the venue such as ice buckets, bottles and roped barrier stands are used to assault people. It is unclear who is fighting whom. Males are seen stamping on people as they are on the floor and door staff lost complete control. Some door supervisors are seen attempting to restrain suspects and others door supervisors are seen standing doing nothing.

CCTV shows suspects running into the fire exit where there are bottles on shelves. Suspects are seen picking up these bottles of spirits. These bottles were then used as weapons to assault people. One male is hit on the head with a bottle. Staff and managers are seen running away.

Some customers leave the venue via the front exit onto Leicester Square and some using the rear fire exit onto Charing Cross Road, WC2. In order to leave via the rear, they had to trespass into next doors venue, known as Global. CCTV enquiries at Global show customers running into their building still holding drinks. Bloody hand prints were left in various places as injured victims limped out (Exhibit ASD/2). Some customers were seen running up towards Capital FM before running back down. Security at Global had to do their best to control this large group of customers and get them out of the premises.

LLC's security are also seen running into Global in an attempt to try and get the group out. Once this group leave onto Charing Cross Road, they are left unchecked and unchallenged. One male is covered in blood. The Police were never told that customers exited via the rear. Vital evidence was lost by not informing Police of this.

At the front of the venue, Police are seen arriving having been called by one of the managers from LLC. No one appears to know what is going on and staff, suspects and victims refuse to engage with Police. The door supervisor who was bottled was receiving treatment from a customer at LLC, as opposed to a member of staff. Blue paper towels were used to stop the bleeding and upon checking the first aid kits, they were not suitable and lacked sterile wipes.

CCTV enquiries also shows staff clearing up the crime scene immediately after the incident and before Police had entered the venue.

The venue closed and no arrests were made due to lack of engagement from persons involved.

A meeting was set up by Police Licensing to attend the venue on the 11th October and speak with all the management. However, the DPS at the time, Mr Prakash KHATRI could not make this because he was busy. It was decided to move the meeting to the 12th October at 3pm. We informed him that all CCTV cameras and body worn camera footage must be available for us to take away. I also requested ID scan print outs of the suspects involved.

On the 11th October, PC Boon 1344CW and I attended Global, which is the building next door. It was the staff at Global who contacted Licensing Services in the Council about this incident, which filtered through to Police Licensing. We were met with Alison Janergen, who is Head of Workspace at Global. She provided us with photo stills of the people leaving LLC and running into Global. The stills also showed a male covered in blood and bloody hand prints left around the scene. These photos are exhibited as ASD/1 - ASD/12.


We also watched CCTV footage, which showed the customers leaving the venue at the front and rear and running through Global. This footage was seized in evidence and exhibited at ASD/19.

On Friday 12th October, PC Boon and I attended LLC at 15:00 hours and were met with the General Manager, Hashem Hosseini, the DPS, Prakash Khatri, Assistant General Managers, Andra Andreapolus and Saeed Hosseini, PSS Security Manager, Dougie Thompson and Solicitor, Robert Sutherland.

We discussed in length the huge failings of the venue and certain licence conditions that were breached. The management mentioned that Police took 15 minutes to arrive on scene but this was rebutted as Police arrived on scene 3 minutes after the initial 999 (CAD 1272 refers).

It was pointed out that the venue lost complete control and allowed fighting to continue. It was also pointed out that they allowed customers to run through fire exits and not treat injured people. They had clearly failed to promote the Licensing Objectives.

We asked the venue to remain closed and not to re-open until there was a complete change of operation. I told those present that a simple change of door team would not be sufficient. We would be looking for something like a restaurant. I also informed them that discussions of conducting an expedited review have taken place with the licensing authorities.

We then viewed the CCTV, which showed the full scale disorder. On one of the cameras we saw an IC1 male wearing a white shirt. He was covered in blood (exhibit ASD/1). This male was attacked by suspects who are seen on the CCTV picking up bottles from a shelf in the fire exit. A suspect hits this male on the head with a bottle and the male falls over. The male then stands and makes his way through the fire exit into Global next door.

We asked for all cameras, which showed any disorder to be downloaded on to a USB stick for us to pick up in a few days. I also requested Body Worn Video footage and ID scan print outs of the suspects involved. I was told by Robert Sutherland that all this will be provided to us.

On Monday 22nd October at approximately 16:00 hours PC Guerra and I attended LLC to pick up the footage and ID scan print outs. We were met with Saeed Hosseini who handed me a USB stick, one print out of one male from ID scan and some incident logs. There was no BWV footage.

The next day when I tried to view the footage on the USB stick, there was no footage from LLC on it. In fact there were several films and other private material on the stick. This was just another example of the incompetence of the venue and lack of interest to assist Police.

Further enquiries into the management at LLC began to raise concern. Police National Computer checks were conducted on Hashem and Saeed Hosseini. Both were known to Police and had been arrested several times. We also received information that a male by the name of Eli (Saeed) Azimi was linked to the venue as a shareholder. Eli Azimi was the DPS for Avalon Night Club. Avalon Night Club was reviewed by Police Licensing in 2014 following on from a fatal shooting on Boxing Day. The Premises licence was revoked by the Licensing Sub Committee. Other checks on all these males revealed them to be Brothers.

A meeting was subsequently called and all parties were asked to attend Portland House, Bressenden Place, SW1 to discuss what was happening with the venue moving forward.

On Wednesday 24th October at 12:30 hours a meeting was held at Portland House. Present from LLC was Eli Azimi, Robert Sutherland, new proposed DPS, James Hoffelner and new Security Manager, Tony Nash from MLB. Present from Police Licensing was PS Whiteley, PC Guerra, PC Boon and myself.

James Hoffelner began explaining that both Saeed and Hashem were no longer with the company and the DPS Prakash Khatri had also been let go. The new DPS was James Hoffelner.

He continued to say that the venue would no longer be a night club and it would be a concept bar by doing beer pong and table tennis. He provided us with material of how the premises would be run. It was discussed that Police Licensing would want the hours pulled back and entry to the premises would be ancillary to the use of beer pong/table tennis, which must be pre-booked. Further prescriptive conditions would also have to be agreed.

We also showed the USB stick to them on a laptop and stated we want all the camera footage as a matter of urgency. James stated he would make this priority. He also stated he would get all the ID scan print outs to me. Furthermore he apologised for the door staff not activating their BWV cameras as per the licence condition.

Following on from the meeting James sent through the ID scan print outs via email and we received a USB stick with the footage from the Violent Disorder. However, several cameras were still missing. PC Boon made contact with Robert Sutherland to rectify this. He stated they couldn't get access to the building as the landlord was being difficult.

On the 25th October, James sent through a first draft of conditions, which he wanted Police to agree with. These are exhibited as ASD/20. These conditions were not suitable from a Police point of view and we were

not satisfied that the venue would operate responsibly. I contacted James via email to inform him of this and he replied saying he was no longer employed by the licence holders, Traditek Ltd. Efforts were then made to contact Robert Sutherland but this was unsuccessful.

The venue breached the following conditions on the Premises licence:

Condition 18 – Not all CCTV has been supplied to Police. I make reference to the male covered in blood who was hit on the head with a bottle in the fire exit. Several requests were made for all the cameras.

Condition 21 – Customers are seen walking around holding bottles;

Condition 22 – Customers leave the venue holding drinking vessels;

Condition 41 – Customers searched without the use of search wands;

Condition 42 - Body Worn Video cameras not activated;

Condition 48 (c) - Body Worn Video cameras not activated;

Condition 49 – Customers allowed entry after 02:00 hours.

At this point, Police Licensing are left with little option and we fear that the venue will re-open and trade as a nightclub. Social media enquiries reveal LLC advertising for bar staff (exhibit ASD/22).

The nature of this crime and disorder is so serious that it represents significant failings in upholding and promoting the Licensing Objectives. The venue has already shown that they breached licence conditions and therefore alternative action and other steps would not address Police concerns in regards to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder. The Police have no confidence in any of the operators or senior management at LLC.

The Metropolitan Police are recommending full revocation of the premises licence at London late Club, 28A Leicester Square, WC2H 7LE.

I am the above named person and this statement relates to the incident that occurred outside of LLC (London Late Club).

LLC is a night club on LEICESTER SQUARE, it's situated between Global Records and a pub called the MOON UNDER THE WATER.

On SUNDAY 7<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER 2018 I was on foot patrol in LEICESTER SQUARE wearing full uniform and a high visibility jacket in the company of PC LAMPTEY 1517CW.

At approximately 0345 hours I was stood on BEAR STREET junction with LEICESTER SQUARE where I was made aware of a call over my personal radio to outside number 28A LEICESTER SQUARE which is the premises of LLC. The call was to a large fight where people had been bottled. 1517CW and I made our way over to the venue where we were met by other members of our unit. CAD 1272 refers.

As I ran towards the venue I noticed a large amount of people scattered outside of the entrance and could hear lots of screaming and shouting. When I arrived outside of the club I saw the staff and a group of customers stood directly outside of the door way, there was a lot of pushing and shoving between both staff and the customers. I called for more officers to attend the venue as there was a significantly larger amount of the public than police officers. A male then fell over the security barriers that are outside of the entrance, it looked like he had been fighting and pushed over so myself and 1532CW approached him to which staff quickly told us that he hadn't been involved in any fight. When staff were asked what had happened and who was involved no one was able to give an answer.

The venue has been emptied of customers due to the incident inside, there was a strong smell of cannabis in the area outside of the club and many of the customers were heavily intoxicated. Due to this there were lots of arguments and fights occurring between various customers of the club, officers had to intervene as the door staff were not trying to move anyone away from the venue and were just stood there watching. While officers tried to establish what had gone on, myself and some others started to move the crowd away from the premises and encouraged them to go home. It quickly became apparent that the staff at LLC had lost control of the situation. There was no system in which the people who had been asked to leave the venue could return to collect their belongings and this was causing a lot of arguments between customers and door staff. I am a police officer on the West End Team (formerly Impact - Team B) and this statement relates to the incident of violent disorder which occurred outside the LONDON LUXURY CLUB on LEICESTER SQUARE, W1.

On SUNDAY 7<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER 2018 at approximately 03.45 hours, I was on foot patrol in full uniform in the company of PC MACE 2188CW and APS CLARKE 1995CW on LEICESTER SQUARE. A call came out over our PR's regarding an immediate-response graded call to the LONDON LUXURY CLUB which was located on the south side of LEICESTER SQUARE, next to the ODEON CINEMA, CAD 1272/07OCT18 refers. We responded due to our proximity to the call, as did the majority of our team due to the reports of a large fight and people being bottled. We arrived on scene approximately 2 minutes later, alongside my colleagues PC LEAH 2187CW, PC LAMPTEY 1517CW, PC BHATTI 1168CW, PC MORRISSEY 1286CW and PS REID 118CW. As we arrived, I could already see it was chaotic. There must have been 30 or more people standing outside the club, due to the security staff being in the process of removing all the revellers who had been inside. As I approached, I could not see anyone fighting but many of the club goers were shouting and causing a scene, with verbal arguments and insults being prominent. My attention was then drawn immediately to a male who had fallen into one of the security barriers. I assumed he'd been pushed and was involved in a fight, so immediately went over to detain him, however security members informed me that it wasn't him who was fighting and that he'd just fallen over due to being drunk. I asked the security staff 'SO WHO'S FIGHTING?' to which they could not answer me. The security staff looked completely bemused and seemed to have no idea what had happened. At this point, I stood back a bit to view the scene and still could not see any immediate fighting, however my attention was then drawn to two of my colleagues (PC MACE 2188CW and APS CLARKE 1995CW) who had a man detained and in handcuffs. I then took this male's friend to one side and asked him to wait and leave his friend to talk to my colleagues. This only took 5 minutes or so and then both males were released. While this was happening and after the males had been released, there was still a lot of raucous behaviour going on between some of the previous revellers. Many were making a scene that they had been told to leave and were demanding they were let back in to get their belongings. The security staff seemed to have no control of this whatsoever and had no system in place to return belongings etc. at this point, I became concerned that reports had come out regarding party-goers being bottled and so asked security staff if they had any information on this. They didn't seem to have any idea and just told me that two of my colleagues had entered the downstairs area of the club and that they should know more.

At this point, my attention was drawn to a male sat up against the wall to the right hand side of the entrance to the club. I was told this was a member of security staff, [REDACTED] and that he had been bottled during the altercation. He had a laceration to the left side of his face, just above and across his eyebrow, as well as a small cut to the right side of his head near his temple. [REDACTED] had with him two members of the public who were performing first aid to him by covering his laceration with blue-roll. The venue's own first aid kits were incomplete, having already been opened and used, with the essentials such as sanitary wipes having not been replaced. None of his colleagues seemed particularly concerned about performing any first aid on him, which made me think they had not been properly trained in the matter. LAS G181 arrived on scene shortly after and transported [REDACTED] to hospital. Shortly after, PS REID and I had a discussion with the manager of the LONDON LATE CLUB to ask him what had happened. He could not give us any more information other than a mass fight had broken out downstairs, which ended up with most of the revellers becoming involved in a violent disorder situation, with 3 people ending up with injuries. There were 10 security staff monitoring over 200 club-goers and none could tell police any information about the scenes of disorder which had happened downstairs in the club. PS REID spoke to DC SADIQ in CW CID who confirmed an incident of Violent Disorder and the manager was informed that the licensing team would be spoken to about the situation, due to the LONDON LATE CLUB being a frequent problematic issue for West End and general City of Westminster officers. I then put the report on for Violent Disorder and it was flagged to the Westminster Police Licensing Unit who immediately arranged for a meeting with the venue managers and legal team to discuss the premises license.

This statement refers to a Mass Violent Disorder Incident I was witness to on the 7th of October 2018. At approximately 0344 a member of the public flagged down myself and my colleagues saying there was a fight down at the LONDON LATE CLUB, en-route to investigate, a CAD came out to a massive fight involving 50+ individuals inside the LONDON'S LATE CLUB stating people had been bottled. Upon arrival there was a small scrap occurring between members of the club clientele that has resulted in them knocking over barriers and ending up on the floor together, from what I have seen. My colleagues 2187CW and 1532CW arrived before me and were dealing with the situation when I arrived, blocking my view of anything further. When I first arrived I was confused as to what was happening, it seemed chaotic and out of control with many people riled up and ready to fight but no fighting occurring at that time besides what I had already stated. Door staff appeared unphased by the disorder around them and continued acting as normal not providing medical attention to various victims, to my knowledge only members of the public were providing any form of first aid. Through hear say I was told that their first aid kits were not properly equipped and out of date.

My attention was drawn to an IC1 male, aged 21 and roughly 5 foot 4 who had a light nosebleed. I asked him if he was ok and he said yes and began to walk away from me, a member of the internal management at the LONDON'S LATE CLUB pointed to him and said to "hold him mate" suggesting he was a suspect in the fight. Myself and APS CLARKE 1995CW detained this male. At the time his friend put his arm around his neck to separate him from us repeatedly saying "he's alright, I'll take him home". We separated him from the detained male however the DP then began trying to pull away from us resulting in him being placed in handcuffs in a rear stack. I then did not pay attention to anything further down towards the club as I was roughly 20 metres North with the detained male and the front of LLC was hidden behind hoarding from the ongoing works at the ODEON cinema.

Roughly 5 minutes later, I have spotted two IC3 males in excess of 6 foot tall in a heated argument with two special constables that had joined our team for the night, from BARNET borough. The males were being escorted away from the front of the club and continued to argue with police and each other. They were left to their own devices as it did not appear that it would turn physical. This male then later returned to the club asking for his coat appearing to visibly intimidate the door staff as they would not approach him again when ignored. At this point LAS also arrived to attend to the victims inside the club who had sustained more serious issues.

This concludes my statement to the best of my knowledge of what has happened.

I am a serving police officer with the Metropolitan Police Service. My shoulder number is 1995CW, and I work at West End Central Police Station. I am a member of the Westminster Impact Zone Team, which provides high visibility patrols in the West End and Soho areas of Central London. I am currently in the role of Acting Sergeant on the team. I have been a police officer for eleven years.

About 03:45 hours on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2018, I was on duty in full uniform in company with PC 1532CW GORDON-GIBSON and PC 2187CW MACE, on Bear Street, near Zoo Bar. We were on foot. A radio message came over the despatch channel regarding a large fight taking place at the LLC nightclub on Leicester Square. We immediately made our way to the scene, arriving within a minute or so.

Upon arrival, I was confronted by a scene of considerable disorder. At least a couple of officers were already there, and I heard one of them calling up for urgent assistance. Many people, seeing the arrival of the police, started to quickly leave the area, but several scuffles were continuing, and I saw two people who were wrestling with each other, falling against the line of barriers that were set up around the entrance to the club.

As officers sought to pull these combatants apart, a member of nightclub staff pointed to a white male who was about five feet nine tall, and said words to the effect of, "YOU NEED TO STOP HIM!"

In company with another officer, I detained the white male. Immediately, another male attempted to interfere, and the male I was in the process of detaining attempted to pull away from me. He did not succeed, and I decided that until we knew what was going on, the male

would have to be detained, as at that stage, I suspected that the male was at least involved in an Affray. Leaving the male with other officers, I then returned to the doors of the nightclub, where I tried to speak with the manager about what had happened. I asked the manager at least twice, I think three times, what had happened. The most he was able to tell me was, "THERE WAS A FIGHT DOWNSTAIRS AND IT CARRIED ON UP HERE. WE ARE CLOSING THE CLUB NOW."

At no point did the manager state how the fight had happened, and he did not mention that there had been casualties. He was not able to tell me who the male we had detained had allegedly attacked. Mostly the manager ignored me. He looked frightened and completely out of his depth. I decided it was useless talking to him any further, so went about the numerous officers who had by then arrived, to see if anyone had approached the officers to make any allegations or complaints. Not a single person had come forward to complain or assist. I decided that there were no longer reasonable grounds to detain the male we had handcuffed, and I asked the officers with him to release him.

I then became aware that there was an injured doorman near the entrance to the club. He was sitting with his back to the wall, being tended to by several people. I spoke to one of the people who was rendering him first aid. My first assumption was that she was a member of club staff, but it became apparent that she was a customer. She stated that the doorman had been bottled, but that no-one knew how it had happened and that an ambulance had been called.

All this time, nightclub staff were still trying to empty the nightclub. Scores of people were still coming out of the nightclub and at least a dozen people were still in the smoking area. The process was slow and disorganised. Many of the patrons clearly resented being asked to leave and there was a very hostile atmosphere. Neither the managers nor the doorstaff seemed on top of things. They seemed overwhelmed and they were reluctant to step in to maintain order. As far as I could see, interventions to keep the peace were left almost entirely to the police officers present.

About 04:00 hours, PS 118CW REID and I went down into the nightclub itself, since that was where the fight had allegedly started. The club was in disarray, with broken glass, damaged décor and discarded shoes and clothing everywhere. A number of people were still in the main room. Staff were trying to clear up, but of more concern were two casualties who both

had injuries which looked to me like they had each been bottled around the head. The first casualty was a white male in his twenties, around five feet ten tall, of slight build and with a thin beard. The second male was white, in his twenties, around six feet tall and of athletic build. Both males were immediately very anti-police. The male with the beard kept referring to us as "Feds" and kept stating that he wouldn't speak to us, wouldn't leave with us and did not want any of our help. His utterances were liberally interspersed with swearwords. The only account of how he received his injuries that I heard him say, was that he had fallen over. I do not believe he had fallen over. As he had a large bleeding cut on the back of his head. The second male was less overtly hostile, but no more co-operative. He made it clear that he did not want to speak to us, and when he saw that PS REID and I had our body worn cameras on, he hid his face from us behind his jumper. In common with the other casualties, this male had a bleeding head wound.

A few people were giving each of the males first aid. One of them told PS REID that she was an off-duty nurse. She was trying to tend to the injuries of the second male, but barstaff had only given her a roll of blue paper towel to work with. PS REID was able to get staff to hand over a first aid kit, but it had no bandages in it. A second first aid kit was then produced, which was complete. As with the doorman at the entrance, first aid was being rendered by nightclub customers rather than staff. Until we had gone downstairs to look for ourselves, I had been completely unaware that there were casualties down there. No staff member had told me, or to the best of my knowledge any other police officer, about the presence of two victims with bleeding head wounds in the nightclub.

The males were both receiving first aid and ambulances were on their way. Neither male wanted to have anything to do with PS REID or I, and since they were victims rather than suspects, we had no power to insist that they talk to us. Given their general obnoxiousness, I did not feel inclined to press the point.

PS REID and I went back outside where most of the customers had now dispersed. Those that remained were now mostly peaceful. An ambulance arrived and the injured doorman was taken in for treatment. PC 1532CW GORDON-GIBSON was detailed to take his particulars and whatever account he was able and willing to give us. After a few minutes, the other two casualties walked out of the LLC and made their way to the ambulance.

The atmosphere was still very anti-police, with people attempting to goad officers, filming

them and calling them pigs. Officers remained professional in spite of these provocations and maintained a presence in the area until the doors to LLC finally closed.

I have policed the West End for three years now, and in all that time I cannot remember a time when the patrons of a licenced premises were so universally anti-police, and so beyond the abilities of the management and security staff to control. The things that stood out to me were the lack of co-operation from the manager I first spoke to, and the fact that first aid was being administered by patrons of the nightclub rather than staff, even though one of the injured parties was himself a member of staff.

This statement constitutes my original notes for this disorder, and it was completed in the Report Writing Room of the Westminster Impact Zone Team at West End Central Police Station at 16:15 hours on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> October 2018.

I am a police officer on the West End Team and this statement relates to the incident that occurred outside the LONDON LUXURY CLUB on Leicester Square, W1.

On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2018 at approximately 03.45 hours, I was on foot patrol duty in uniform on Charing Cross Road, close to Cranbourne Street. A call came out over my PR regarding an immediate response graded call to the LLC which is located on the East Side of Leicester Square, next to the Odeon Cinema. The CAD reference for this call was 1272/7OCT/18. I made my way to the location, as did most of my team due to reports of a large fight breaking out. I arrived on scene approximately 2-4 minutes later. I noticed most of my colleagues were either already on scene or arriving just ahead of me. As I arrived I could see a large crowd scattered in front of the club, with PS REID talking appearing to talk with the club security. There around 30-40 people standing outside. I established that these people were inside the club, but due to a large scale fight occurring inside they decided to leave the club for their own safety. No one I spoke with stated whether they had seen any disorder occurring, just hearing people screaming or shouting. I could not see anyone fighting in the area. My attention was then drawn to a male who appeared to be shouting at another reveller, while his friends were trying to calm him down. This irate male seemed to be complaining about the club security, as he was directing his attention to 2 security guards standing outside the club. I then approached them and heard the male demand the club return his jacket. The security stated they had checked the venue but could not find the male's jacket. After a few moments the friends of this male managed to pull him away, before eventually walking off towards Irving Street.

I then noticed an incident involving another reveller with an obvious facial injury. I noticed 3 of my colleagues dealing with this situation, and walked over straight away as there was a crowd forming around them. I told the crowd to move back and let the officers tend to the injured male. I then asked a couple of the people whether they had witnessed what had happened and how the male received the injury, but no one came forward.

LAS arrived on scene shortly afterwards and transported the injured male to hospital. Throughout the whole time I was there, the club security looked completely bemused and seemed to have no idea what had happened and not too interested in trying to quell the disorder or help out anyone who needed any kind of assistance, whether it was for lost property or administering first aid.

I continued to patrol the area until all of the revellers had left the location safely and without further incident.

On my arrival at the scene I saw a black Male who appeared to have been thrown out of the club being smashed into the barriers. It was not clear who had pushed the Black Male into the barriers as there were about a hundred people outside the venue moving and shouting almost at each other. A white Male with blood on this face rushed through the crowd and attempted to walk away from the scene. Security staff rushed from the club towards Police Officers and pointed at the white Male with blood on his face and the Black male that had fallen into the barriers and said the following "It's him, it's him". APS 1995CW CLARKE and PC 2188CW MACE therefore detained the while Male with blood on his face in order to carry out further investigation. I am not very sure but I believe the Black Male that had fallen over the barriers was also detained by one of my colleagues.

Please note that the nature of the scene outside the club was verbally aggressive, chaotic, loud and agitating. It was clear that there had been a fight inside the club.

PC 118CW REID attended the club in a bid to gather evidence that would enable the arrest of the subjects that were detained by Police.

Please note that the security was were uncooperative, unwilling to substantiate any information and were very reluctant to provide any information whatsoever.

**Account from Victim**

The only victim willing to give details to police was VIW1, who is a member of door staff at the venue. VIW1 and VIW2 were both very uncooperative with (and anti) police and refused to give any details or information.

VIW1 wasn't entirely sure what had happened other than there was a large fight between customers in the downstairs area of the venue.

At some point during the fight, VIW1 has become caught in the cross fire and has been hit with what he believes to be a bottle across the left side of his head, which has caused a deep laceration to just above and across his eyebrow, which was bleeding severely.

VIW1 was transported to ST THOMAS' HOSPITAL by G181 for treatment.

**Account from Witness / Informant**

VIW4 is the MANAGER of the venue. He informed police he didn't know what had happened, just that a huge fight had broken out downstairs.

Police were alerted to a fight which was happening outside LLC – London Late Club, however when we arrived on scene it was unclear on who was fighting who due to the large amount of people.

As many revellers from the venue as possible were questioned by police, however no one seemed to have any idea how the fight had started or who was the main protagonist.

It seems that quite a few people were involved and all attacking each other in a general violent

disorder situation and nobody was willing to give police any information on the origins of the altercation.

#### Scene Management

Incident took place in the downstairs area of LLC – London Late Club.

Located at 28A LEICESTER SQUARE.

10 members of security staff were working at the venue and there were approximately 200 club-goers inside at the time.

As officers arrived on scene, there was a large amount of people grouped around outside the venue, as well as various parties shouting and gesturing at each other.

One male was detained and questioned, however he was released with no further action and the rest of the revellers were eventually dispersed.

#### Physical Evidence (including forensics)

Images captured of injuries to VIW1, exhibited by PC GORDON-GIBSON 1532CW - these have been exhibited in a statement as HGG/02, HGG/03, HGG/04 and HGG/05.

Images will also be uploaded to a CrimInt created by APS CLARKE 1995CW relating to the incident - CWRT00993984

BWV was worn by ALL officers at the scene, which captures the general scenes of chaos and disorder, as well as officers dealing with various mini-incidents that took place during the time on scene.

Each individual officer's footage will be uploaded to this CRIS report.

#### CCTV

Manager of the venue was spoken to regarding CCTV.

He informed police that the incident should be caught on camera and that he would review it and burn a copy for officers to collect.

#### Local Enquiries

As many members of the public and customers who had been inside the venue as possible were all questioned by police regarding the incident.

No one seemed to have much of a clue

as to how the incident originated.

**Suspect Management**

No suspect was identified.

It was a general violent disorder situation with everyone fighting each other.

No victims or witnesses wanted to inform police of any vital information regarding the main protagonists, nor did anyone want to pursue any allegations.

**Other**

CID was made aware and consulted at the scene by PS REID. PS REID spoke to DC SADIQ, who confirmed the situation of Violent Disorder.

The venue is a well-known problematic area for the West End, being particularly so for Impact officers on night shifts.

This is not the first issue of fights/weapons/public disorder incidents that police have had to deal with at the venue.

Security staff were not particularly helpful during the altercation and could not confirm to officers who was fighting who, nor did they seem to get involved in breaking people apart.

First aid on VIW1 was given by members of the public who had ELS training, as staff at the venue seemed to have no idea what to do, nor did they seem very concerned about one of their own being harmed.

The venue's first aid kits were incomplete, having already been opened and used, with the essentials such as sanitary wipes having not been replaced.

First aid was thus given using blue-roll, which is used by staff to wipe up alcohol and is not particularly sanitary to use on open wounds.

Manager of the venue informed police that all photo ID of revellers is scanned and kept on record upon entry, so details of suspects could be obtained should they be identified on camera.

Evening all,

According to the above CRIS, you were all involved in dealing with the violent disorder that occurred at LLC, Leicester Square last weekend.

My name is Adam and I am one of the officers from the Westminster Police Licensing Unit.

As you probably all know, this venue has been causing untold grief to the emergency services, local authorities, local businesses and innocent members of the public. Over the course of the last 6 months (since it has become LLC), we have been monitoring their progress. We have worked with the venue to improve and it would seem, they are just not fit to be night club operators.

We are meeting with the venue managers and their legal team

Hi Paul.

Thank you so much. It's a really good statement.

Just so you know we met with the management and their legal team on Friday. We discussed all the failings from the venue and how the entire incident was a shambles and how they lost complete control. It was highlighted that 14 officers were used for just the one incident. They tried to claim that it took 15 minutes for police to arrive but this was challenged by us as Police TOA'd 2 and half minutes after the 999 call.



**Details of Investigation**

We requested the venue close voluntarily and they are not to open until they have a complete change of operation e.g. Become a restaurant. They were quite shocked by this. If they refused to close we would do an expedited review to

revoke their premises licence.

We received a phone call later on by their legal team stating that the venue will voluntarily close for 2 weeks and in that time put things in place to change the operations. They will not open until we met with them in 2 weeks to discuss things. This is their last chance basically. Any more incidents and we are going straight for an expedited review.

Unfortunately we have to work with the venue and take a stepped approach before doing reviews. But we have worked with them enough now so any future incidents and it will be game over for them!

I'm gathering all the evidence against them. I've got all the CCTV, BWV cams, CCTV from Global next door and Statements. I've not heard anything back from the other officers I emailed. Is there any chance you could chase them up? It will only be a matter of time before I close those venue for good and need those statements as evidence.

Outside security were not in yellow hi viz in breach of Condition 45. This was raised with head of security, Kris, who said he would get it rectified that night.

Searches were not being conducted with a search wand in breach of Condition 41. This was rectified immediately.

An ID Scan machine WAS in place & being used. It also

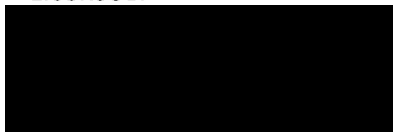
CCTV - Ronnie did not know how to operate the system efficiently & had to call Andrea the Assistant General Manager to operate it & she struggled to do but managed eventually. 9. Prior to 23:00 customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
10. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
11. The number of persons permitted on the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 235 persons.
12. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
13. There shall be a Personal Licence Holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
14. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all other persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
15. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
16. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
17. The consumption of alcohol on the premises shall cease 30 minutes after the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol.
18. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
19. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.



20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised session and will record the following:

- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
- (b) all ejections of patrons
- (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
- (d) any incidents of disorder
- (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
- (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment
- (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service

21. After 23:00 hours, there should be no consumption of drinks (excluding hot drinks) from vessels other than polycarbonate vessels. This condition shall not apply to the serving and consumption of wine, sparkling wine, spirits or champagne bottles with a minimum size of 70cl and champagne flutes supplied by waiter/waitress service to tables. Meeting at London Late Club, 28A Leicester Square, WC2H 7LE on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> October 2018.

Persons present:



PC Adam Deweltz and PC Cheryl Boon

A meeting was called to discuss the incident of violent disorder from Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2018 at approx. 0345hrs. The meeting began with Adam outlining what the concerns were and how this was not managed correctly.

Nazir explained how this happened between two groups that did not know each other, one group of black males and one group of Albanian males. The night appeared to be going ok and then an unknown incident has sparked everything off. He states that it was so quick they did not have time to react (from CCTV this fight is in progress for at least two minutes in the main area and continues in other areas after this time. Therefore not a short fight)

Dougie has stated that he thinks from a security point of view they dealt well with searching and ID scanning all patrons.

Ronnie stated that there needs to be better engagement with the promoters and more details needs to be obtained beforehand. Dougie agrees they need to vet the promoters better.

Two SIA with BWV were positioned out the front of venue so unlikely that they had any footage of the disorder within, however no one from LLC even stated that they had checked this.

Adam asked if all patrons were ID scanned, they confirmed that they were. He asked if from this they had managed to ID the main suspects from ID scan, they stated that they were working on it. Again it appeared as though this had not even been considered.

Nazir stated that they tried to manage the different groups after the fight, black males to the front and Albanians to the rear (from CCTV black males are seen to try and exit out the rear and have tried to use empty glass bottles on the main victim to carry on with this fight)

Andra states that she called police at 0345 when this incident first began and it took police 15 minutes to arrive. After checking cad and confirming her mobile number she called police at 0345, police were on scene PS REID 118CW at 0348hrs. When asked about this she stated that she needed police downstairs, highlighted that this is a lack of communication on the venues fault and they should be speaking to each other to direct police to the correct location.

First Aid methods were questioned, they have shown Police the first aid kits and they appear adequate. They state that they have enough first aid trained staff at the venue.

When asked about the injury to the SIA and how it was caused they all stated that they did not know, when highlighted that they have a duty of care for him and has anyone spoken to him since they stated they hadn't. When



asked again Prakash states that they don't know what it was but could have been a glass, an ice bucket or a bit of ice.

Adam has stated how they are a crime generator, Ronnie has replied to this by saying that he did not think so. It has been explained to them that they are the main cause for concern currently with police and local authority licensing departments. No other venue has had a meeting to discuss issues that have arisen and then 2 weeks later have such a large violent disorder. Also highlighted that there are a lot of venues within Westminster that do not experience these problems.

There is a general attitude amongst them that this was just a fight and it was over very quickly (from the CCTV this is clearly not the case) and that there are no great concerns that they shouldn't be able to continue to trade in this manner in the future. Highlighted to them the severity of the incident and the amount of police that have attended to try and assist, they are a massive drain on police resources. Explained to them that these fights should not be happening, they should be preventing these incidents and it should not reach this stage.

Adam has explained how police want them to voluntarily close so that they can drastically change their venture, he stated that they are not a safe night club operator and are not promoting the licensing objectives with regards to crime and disorder and public safety. Explained that if they did not close then we would seek for an review or if they did close and re-open and experience further problems then we would seek an expedited review.

CCTV viewed which shows an initial altercation where SIA eject a couple of males, then there continues to be more pushing and shoving so the lights get turned on and music off. Then a large brawl takes place, where there are different groups fighting. One male is seen to be stamped upon on the floor at various locations. At one stage there is only one SIA left in this area who can only stand and watch due to being completely out numbered with the amount of disorder going on around him. It is then seen from an alternative camera in the empty bottle storage area that people are being evacuated out of this way, however a couple of suspects see this as an opportunity to arm themselves with these empty bottles and try and attack the same male who was stamped upon before. Also on a different camera out the front there is still disorder going on with barriers being knocked over and scuffles taking place. All the footage shows a complete lack of any control or management and the SIA were completely over run with the number of people fighting in different location within the venue.



Robert SUTHERLAND (RS) – Solicitor acting for the Premises License Holder, Traditek Limited



On 24<sup>th</sup> October 2018 at 1230hrs in room 23:3 PORTLAND HOUSE a meeting took place between Westminster Police Licensing team and interested parties from the former London Late Club, 28A Leicester Square.

RS stated that SA is not a manager of the premises but is on the admin/property maintenance side of the business, he is however a stakeholder in the business and owns 10%. States that the other males who we believe to be his brother (Ronnie and Yasin) have both been sacked and are no longer involved. The same with Prakash the old DPS. All staff have gone, the only people left are SA and the AGM Andra. They state that Andra might stay at the AGM.

SA confirmed that the old managers were Hasheem HOSSEINI and Yassin HOSSEINI. Jaspall and Anita TAWAL are the directors of Traditek, they are husband and wife. RS states that they were not able to be here today as they were on holiday. He hopes they will be at subsequent meetings.

SA confirms that the HOSSEINI's were employees of Traditek and that Jaspall had sacked them. SA was kept on as he is a shareholder and is an investor in the business but is not a decision maker in the process and not involved in the day to day running of the business. He claims the other two males are his cousins not brothers. He then confirms to CW that he still has the other business in Shoreditch.

CW explained how it's the worse incident of disorder she has ever seen in a license premises in Westminster, a horrendous incident and that she does not want it to be a nightclub anymore.

JH has then produced a lot of paperwork about a business called SINK PONG. He explains how it is the same format as used in SA other licensed premises. The other venue is covered over 4 floors, states that the crime stats at the venue are very low. The plan is to open 10am until late, they are proposing 3am and is a bar that offers dancing. He states that it has an Andy Warhol design within. All employees receive training and they have a staff manual, they will also be serving food all day, American style dining. Bar that offers dancing but not RnB or hip hop music and food will be served until the terminal house. Shoreditch currently operates the following hours:



1000 - 2330hrs – Monday to Thursday

1000 – 0230hrs – Friday/Saturday

Sunday – Closed

Last entry time 30 minutes before.

They want to propose Polycarbonate throughout even during the day apart from crockery. They are moving to a more professional clientele, not same as LLC.

They are going to upgrade the CCTV to 32 cameras with 120 day retention. 5 externally monitored cameras monitored by separate company. Rydal CCTV company.

They are going to ensure that all SIA have body worn video, they are going to use Axon. They are going to get 10 BWV, will have 8 SIA at peak times and then have two spare BWV. If 3 of them are in close proximity to each other and their BWV is activated then all of them will activate.

They are also looking into getting Medics at the venue, Ice Blue Medical. College of Policing to do crime scene training.

TN states that this is the first time that his company MLB it will have worked with a night club. He has previously refused to work with a company in the West End as they wouldn't adhere to their license conditions.

RS states that Adrian Studd is reviewing what happened during the violent disorder and to now try and implement new policies and practises to negate this from happening again. Third party is looking into all aspects of how it happened before.

CW asks for a copy of the license in Shoreditch to show their current opening hours and conditions. RS provided the license number as LBH-PRE-T-1262 which on the License is called Blueberry Bar and Kitchen.

JH states that LLC is now dead. CW asked if all customers are going to come in via being pre booked. Says that if it is not pre booked then it is just to going to be a bar, states that it needs to be conditioned. JH agreed that they could work with it being conditioned. SA says that Shoreditch has different conditions to each floor and a greater capacity.

CW states that she is concerned that it is just going to remain a nightclub with a nightclub license. She has asked that they look at the licenses for Arrows and Flight club for ideas on their conditions. If they are not going to step away from night club then we will expedite a review.

RS states that everything is changing. He needs to think about new conditions, he states that they haven't implement any changes yet as they did not know what was going to happen next. He says that they need time to tweak the license to fit the new business. They wont implement anything until we have an agreement as no point until then.

JH states that they will be food lead at lunch time and throughout the day then after 2100hrs then could condition for it to be pre booked for beer Pong.

CW then asks about CCTV from the venue that is a memory stick that was collected from Yassin by AD. RG shows what the memory stick contains on the monitor and it shows different files including 'My kids and wife' and Yassin's bank statement. RS, JH and SA all apologies for this, RS states that they will get this sorted immediately. It is then highlight the inadequacies of the incident reports,



some of them are even timed before the incident even happened. Also why have police only been provided with only one ID scan print out when there were a lot of people involved. SA states that he thought that Yassin had put all of ID scan information on the memory stick . RS states that he knows it reflects very badly on them and apologised again. CW has stated that Police are dubious about Andra remaining as AGM and how previously at meeting she has spoken over Police and council and has not listened to any advice given. JH states that she does not need to stay in position.

CW states that as well as the pre booked condition there needs to be a change to times, suggested pulling back the hours to 0100hrs and last entry at midnight. Or conditioned to after 2100hrs needs to be pre booked. Final entry of 0200hrs Friday and Saturday and final entry 0030hrs during the week. The venue has to be ancillary to beer Pong with a maximum number of people of drinking before/after the beer Pong. However if they pull back the hours then we won't need to put on the beer pong condition. There should be no dancing. They could be a 0100hrs bar.

AD has shown them a list of new proposed conditions. They need to look at them.

CW has explained how at the committee previously it was sold to the members as a 'Vibe Dining', it would not have been granted in the current state for its current business purpose.

JH explained how they have spoken to Dave Doyle he is happy to look into the fire exit that goes through global and change the protocol for it.

CW states that police are happy with the concept but that it is subject to conditions as there are lots of concept bars.

RG has asked what involvement Traditek will have in the new venture. SA states that they are just financial investors. JH is in charge and he can share a list of new employees to Police. Suggested that they have a condition that states that the old manager Ronnie and Yassin can not work at this venue.

JH explains how they will do in house training and combine it with the staff from Shoreditch venue. Also all staff will have personal licenses.

RS the venue is going to remain closed until further agreement with police Licensing. Once the conditions are finalised, minor variations, change James to DPS. The intention is to re-open the 2<sup>nd</sup> week in November. CW is happy with that date.







I am a Police Officer within the Westminster Police Licensing Team and I am currently dealing with several complaints of crime and disorder and a lack of public safety at London Late Club (LLC), 28A Leicester Square, WC2H 7LE.

I have been informed by Alison Jannergren from Global that you are the Building Management Company for both Global and LLC. I know that you have been made aware of the incident at approx. 0345hrs on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2018 by Alison, whereby customers from LLC have entered into Global via the fire exit and left blood stains on the walls/railings and also left Global's security to deal with issues that they should not have had to contend with. We have discussed issues with Global who are still compiling the evidence for us and we are meeting today with the manager and Licensing Solicitor for LLC.



This email is to highlight to you our concerns in the management of 28A Leicester Square and the way in which this company has been operating. Whilst we are dealing with issues from a Police Licensing Perspective, we look to you to assist other businesses in close proximity to this venue that are being negatively affected by this operator and ask if there are any remedies that you can take to assist?

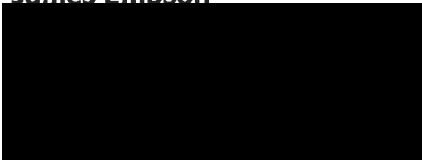

**Licensing**

- 1.1.1 The Tenant is to ensure that the Premises Licence required for the Permitted Use remains in force during the Term in the name of the Tenant or in the name of such Licence Holder as approved in writing by the Landlord.
- 1.1.2 The Tenant or Licence Holder shall not without the previous written consent of the Landlord (such consent not to be unreasonably withheld), transfer or apply to transfer, vary or apply to vary (other than a variation of the Designated Premises Supervisor), surrender or attempt to surrender, allow to lapse or be suspended, the Premises Licence.

**This statement (consisting of 3 pages) is true to the best of my knowledge and belief and I make it knowing that, if it is tendered in evidence, I shall be liable to prosecution if I have wilfully stated in it anything which I know to be false, or do not believe to be true.**

I am a Senior City Inspector employed by Westminster City Council and I am an authorised officer for the purposes of the Licensing Act 2006.

On Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> July 2018 at 00:00 hours I was on duty with my colleague, Mr. Lee CAVILL, City Inspector in LEICESTER SQUARE, WC2. Mr. CAVILL and I arrived outside the premises known as the 'LONDON LUXURY CLUB', 28A LEICESTER SQUARE, LONDON WC2H 7LE.

The purpose of this visit was to follow up from my visit to the premises on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2018 and to check matters detailed in my letter to TRADITEK Limited dated 19<sup>th</sup> June 2018. I now formally produce a copy of my letter dated 19<sup>th</sup> June 2018 addressed to TRADITEK Limited as Exhibit DF/1.

On arrival at the premises, Mr. CAVILL and I carried out observations outside. I saw a group of females queuing outside and an interaction with the door staff and enquiries and discussions being made about whether the group were on the quest list. I introduced myself to the door staff by showing my Westminster City Council identification. After a few minutes a male introduced himself as the "GM., "RONNIE". I now know this male as Mr. Saeed HOSSEINI of 216B CITY ROAD, LONDON EC1V 1AJ. D.O.B: 18.05.1988. Mr. HOSSEINI confirmed he was in charge. I introduced Mr. CAVILL and asked if we could

walk around following my initial inspection in June. Mr. HOSSEINI agreed and confirmed that they were using the premises licence. Whilst I was outside the premises I could see there were 5 SIA door staff outside but only one was wearing a Body Worn Camera. As Mr. HOSSEINI, Mr. CAVILL and I entered the premises I met with Ms. Andra ANDREAPOLUS who was in charge of the premises in June 2018.

Mr. HOSSEINI, Mr. CAVILL, Ms ANDREAPOLU and I went into the basement level. Whilst we were walking I asked Mr. HOSSEINI if he was in charge and he confirmed he was. I asked if the premises was open and he said that it was a "private party". I asked if they were using their premises licence and he confirmed that they were.

On the basement level I noted that there were groups of males and females standing and sitting. I could hear music which I would describe as 90's RnB/ hip-hop. Mr. HOSSEINI, Mr. CAVILL, ANDREAPOLUS and I passed a bar on our right hand side and walked through the main dance floor. I noted the remaining SIA security staff inside but none of them were wearing a Body Worn Camera. We then went to the rear. I saw a kitchen area where a number of male staff were handling shisha pipes. I went into the room and confirmed that they were electronic shisha pipes. I checked the rear means of escape and this was clear.

Mr. HOSSEINI, Mr. CAVILL Ms. ANDREAPOLUS and I then walked back through the dance floor in the direction we came. Again, I looked at all the SIA staff and confirmed with Mr. CAVILL that they were not wearing Body Worn Cameras. We passed through the bar counter and into a small office. I asked for the premises licence and Mr. HOSSEINI passed me the premises licence: 18/02327/LIPDPS. I now formally produce a copy of the premises licence dated 29<sup>th</sup> March 2018 as Exhibit DF/2. I looked through the premises licence and saw the relevant condition at condition 48(a). I asked Mr. HOSSEINI if he had any identification on him. He said he did not but gave me his full name, his home address and his date of birth.

I then said to Mr. HOSSEINI,

"Condition 48(a) states 'From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing.' My colleague and I have looked at your 9 SIA members of security staff but only 1 member of staff is wearing a Body Worn Video Camera. It is an offence contrary to Section 136 Licensing Act 2003 to carry on a licensable activity/knowingly allow a licensable activity otherwise than under and in accordance with an authorisation provided by a premises licence. I must caution you. You do not have to say anything, but it may harm your defence if you do not mention, when questioned, something which you later rely on in court. Anything you do say may be given in evidence. Do you understand?"

**Time of caution: 00:17 hours**

Reply: "I do understand".

I then said, "You are not under arrest. You are free to leave if you want to and may contact a solicitor if you wish. Is there anyone you may wish to contact?"

Reply: "Well there is nothing at this stage but if it requires then by all means. I have a number of E-mails or text messages that I have made, enquiries to get a second body cam, If they require me to get you any letter from them. That's no problem at all".

I then asked Mr. HOSSEINI a series of questions.

"What is your position here?"

Reply: "General Manager".

"Do you accept that condition 48(a) is being breached and that only 1 Body Worn Video Camera is being worn?"

Reply: "I'm not going to accept that. But because it is in progress. By one O'clock I should have it".

"So there is only one Body Cam being worn at this time, correct?"

Reply: "At this stage. Yes."

"Are these premises open to the public today?"

Reply: "Is not trading for the public. It is a privately hire. For the birthday event".

"Is the premises licence in use?"

Reply: "Not at this stage. Because it is not open to the public. So not yet. But it will be I'm sure".

"How long have you been working at these premises?"

Reply: "Since the beginning of April. As part-time because it was open part time".

"Are you in charge of these premises at this time?"

Reply: "As a General Manager, yes I am".

"What instructions have you given your staff in relation to condition 48 and Body Worn Cameras?"

Reply: "I think usually what we do is we have one dedicated person which he wears at this time and he is fully trained on how to use it. He is a senior member of the team".

"What directions, other actions or systems in place to ensure compliance?"

Reply: "How to charge it and use it. Make sure that they follow the procedure in case of an incident or event is happening. To use it and report it accordingly. And of course we have a management team to distribute if the police is going to make an enquiry".

"When did you start working today?"

Reply: "8pm".

"What time do you finish work?"

Reply: "Usually 3, 4, 5am. Depends how busy."

"What time did these premises open?"

Reply: "11:30".

"What time do these premises close?"

Reply: "6 for music and so on. Usually cut off at 4.30".

"Do you have a financial interest in the business?"

Reply: "Like every Manager, are ambitious to have some hard work and sweat."

"Are you a director of Traditek Limited?"

Reply: "No".

"Who else is concerned in the operation or ownership of this business?"

Reply: "Dipendra MAHARAJAH, Financial Director and Prekash KHATRI, Operational Director."

"Again, can you explain again why there is only 1 Body Cam being used?"

Reply: "I think, we had before 2 and we do have invoices. But I think one of them probably didn't work"

At 00:35 I reminded Mr. HOSSEINI that he was still under caution and stated, "You will be reported for carrying on / knowingly allowing an unauthorised licensable activity otherwise in accordance with the authorisation provided by a premises licence. This is an offence under Section 136 of the Licensing Act 2003. Is there anything else you wish to say or other comment you wish to make?"

Reply: "All I say is that this is not a major issue. We have made a number of contact to get another body cam"

"I have recorded notes in your presence of the replies that you have made to my questions. Would you like to read over my notes and sign at the end of each of your replies to confirm that they are an accurate record of what was said? You may also indicate how you consider them to be inaccurate if you do not consider them to be a true record of what was said".

Reply: That's fine for me".

Mr. HOSSEINI declined to sign the record and the interview concluded at 00:36 hours.

I write to you in relation to my licensing visit that was carried out at the above premises on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2018 at 23:50 hours. I met with the Duty Manager, Ms Andra Andreapolus.

A number of issues were detected in relation to the Licensing Act 2003 and the compliance with conditions attached to your premises licence, 18/02327/LIPDPS. I have detailed these below:

1. The most up to date premises licence was not produced.
2. Ms. Andra Andreapolus was unable to produce her original personal licence.
3. Substantial food was not available at the premises.
4. None of the SIA door staff on duty were wearing a Body Worn Video Camera.

In relation to issue 1, above, this matter has been brought to your attention so that you can full comply with the requirements set out in Section 57 of the Licensing Act 2003.

In regards to issue 2, above, Section 135(4) Licensing Act 2003 states that it is an offence for a person to fail to produce their personal licence to an authorised person.

Issue 3, above, is contrary to condition 12 of your premises licence which states;

"Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises."

Finally issue 4, above is a breach of conditions, 37, 40 and 48. These conditions state,

"From 21:00 hours, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), a minimum of 2 SIA door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises. A minimum of one shall be deployed at the entrance and shall wear a Body Worn Video Camera. Additional door supervisors shall be employed as determined by a documented management risk assessment taking cognizance of police advice of 1 SIA per 100 customers before 23.00hrs and 1 SIA per 50 customers thereafter, (or such other advice as may be given from time to time). At all times from 23:00 hours, 2 door supervisors shall be deployed at the entrance. The risk assessment to be made available upon request."

"At least 2 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business. A minimum of one to be wearing Body Worn Video throughout trading times and for 30 minutes after closing whilst dispersing"

"From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing."

**Please note that Section 136(1) of the Licensing Act 2003 states that it is an offence for any person to carry on or attempt to carry on a licensable activity on or from any premises otherwise than under and in accordance with an authorisation. It is also an offence for a person to knowingly allow the licensable activity to be carried on.**

Therefore, could you please make the necessary arrangements to comply with the requirements of your current premises licence and to fully promote the licensing objectives. We will monitor the situation and further enforcement action may be considered if breaches are detected.

#### Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4.
  - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
    - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
      - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
      - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
    - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
    - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6.
  - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.



- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -
  - (a) a holographic mark, or
  - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

- 7. The responsible person must ensure that -
  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
  - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8. (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
  - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
  - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -
 
$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

    - (i) P is the permitted price,
    - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
    - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
  - (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
    - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
    - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or



- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
  - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
  - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

9. Prior to 23:00 customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
10. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
11. The number of persons permitted on the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 235 persons.
12. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
13. There shall be a Personal Licence Holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
14. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all other persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
15. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
16. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
17. The consumption of alcohol on the premises shall cease 30 minutes after the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol.
18. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
19. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised session and will record the following:
  - (a) all crimes reported to the venue.
  - (b) all ejections of patrons
  - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
  - (d) any incidents of disorder
  - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
  - (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment
  - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
21. After 23:00 hours, there should be no consumption of drinks (excluding hot drinks) from vessels other than polycarbonate vessels. This condition shall not apply to the serving and consumption of wine, sparkling wine, spirits or champagne bottles with a minimum size of 70cl and champagne flutes supplied by waiter/waitress service to tables. Staff shall clear all empty wine, spirit and champagne bottles promptly from



the tables. Customers shall not be permitted to leave their table carrying any such glass bottles or drink directly from the bottle.

22. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
23. After 23:00 hours, all customers entering the premises will have their 1D scanned on entry.
24. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
25. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
26. All emergency exit doors shall be available at all material times without the use of key, code, card or similar means.
27. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
28. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.
29. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
30. All fabrics, curtains, drapes and similar features including materials used in finishing and furnishing shall be either non-combustible or be durably or inherently flame-retarded fabric. Any fabrics used in escape routes (other than foyers), entertainment areas or function rooms, shall be non-combustible.
31. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport, proof of age card with the PASS Hologram or Military ID card.
32. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
33. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
34. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
35. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
36. No collections of waste or recycling materials (including bottles) from the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day.
37. From 21:00 hours, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), a minimum of 2 SIA door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises. A minimum of one shall be deployed at



the entrance and shall wear a Body Worn Video Camera. Additional door supervisors shall be employed as determined by a documented management risk assessment taking cognizance of police advice of 1 SIA per 100 customers before 23.00hrs and 1 SIA per 50 customers thereafter, (or such other advice as may be given from time to time). At all times from 23:00 hours, 2 door supervisors shall be deployed at the entrance. The risk assessment to be made available upon request.

38. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system (including where applicable any Body Worn Video system) shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
39. A minimum of 5 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises from 23.00hrs to close 7 days per week. A minimum of 2 on the entrance and 3 inside the premises (This is still subject to discussion based on what the premises is to become) Prior to this time door staff numbers will be at least a 1:100 ratio unless decided otherwise by a risk assessment conducted by a member of the venue's management team.
40. At least 2 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business. A minimum of one to be wearing Body Worn Video throughout trading times and for 30 minutes after closing whilst dispersing
41. After 21.00hrs any persons entering or re-entering the premises shall be searched by a SIA licensed member of staff and monitored by the premises CCTV system. Search wands will be used during all searches.
42. Body worn video systems used by the premises must be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of staff
43. All staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure they are confident it's use. A record will be kept on the premises of which staff have been trained. This record will be available to the relevant authority for inspection upon request
44. Where the premises are operating for a specific pre-booked event or occasion when a guest list is in operation, only a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager will be authorised to add additional names to the guest list. Any additions less than 48 hours before the pre-booked event or occasion must be legibly entered on the list and signed for by a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager. The list will be kept for a period of 31 days following the event and will be made available immediately for inspection upon the request by a Police Officer or Council Officer.
45. After 21:00, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), all security engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high visibility yellow jackets or vests.
46. All externally promoted events held at the venue shall be notified to the Metropolitan Police Service. A form 696 will be completed and submitted within 14 days prior to the event, or such less time as agreed with the Police. When carrying out the risk assessment for the event and holding the event the venue will take into account any reasonable advice received from the Westminster Police Licensing Team and the central Clubs/Promoters Police Team who receive the form 696 (or their equivalent) and upon a reasonable request by Police the venue will not run the event.



47. After 23:00 hours, or such earlier time as deemed necessary following risk assessment, a search policy shall be implemented of customers entering the premises. Such policy to be documented having regard to police advice and shall be made available upon request.
48. a) From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing.
- b) All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- c) A Body worn video system shall be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of door staff.
- d) All door staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure that they are confident in its use. A record shall be kept on the premises of which door staff have been trained. This record will be available to the Police or Licensing Authority for inspection upon request.
49. There shall be no admittance or re-admittance to the premises after 02:00 except for patrons permitted to temporarily leave the premises to smoke.

My own involvement is the one visit I made (on 11.8.18, where I was unhappy with the door staff) and the subsequent meeting I attended with you. Then the venue ceased trading. Do you want a statement from me ?

There is a new application to transfer the licence ( see 18/14289/LIPT West End Property Company Limited ) so is it still intended to review the licence ?

If so, the application to transfer the licence to Traditek Limited ( 18/01171/LIPT ) was submitted in Feb 2018 ... do you know when that company's actual trading under the licence started ? Early March ??? (I became responsible for the venue on 1 Sept)

But I see the following visits on Uniform for this year :

19.08.2018 M Ratley .... *During previous visits this night club has been found to be breaching conditions attached to its premises licence. On this occasion observations were made of the management of the queue and search procedures, before a walk through was conducted with the duty managers (Andra Cristina ANDREAPOLUS and Ronnie HOSSEINI). It was found that only female's bags were being searched despite a licence condition that after 21:00 any persons entering or re-entering should be searched and that search wands should be used during all searches. Shortcomings were also identified in the maintenance of the club's incident log.*

11.08.2018 T Miah .... *Visit carried out on behalf of Dan Ferrer to collect CCTV .... 11.08.18 @ 23:00hrs and TM Visit (arranged in advance) conducted to collect CCTV images of some recent incidents, but 4 members of security staff sought to delay our entry to the venue. The Duty Manager told that this was not acceptable, as we have a statutory right to enter and inspect licensed venues without being delayed for obvious reasons). She agreed and apologised. She was asked to investigate how this incident was allowed to arise and to set out in writing how it will be avoided in the future.* FK

17.08.18 Response received from duty manager after having spoken to security staff. Referred to Dan Ferrer in Team 2 for any further action.

"From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing."

General Manager interviewed under cautioned and reported for offence contrary to Section 136 of the Licensing Act 2003.

Outcome: Licence Holder Limited Company to be invited to formal interview and prosecution to be considered for both parties.

08.04.2018 S Liburd ... carried out visit upon request of Police licensing team and team 2

Carried out a visit London Luxury Club as requested at 00:00hrs.

An inspection was carried out at the premises looking mainly at the concerns that were raised.

1. All staff at the door were wearing Hi-Viz vest
2. All searches were carried out using the wand and a pat down
3. Spoke to Ronnie who introduced us to Andra Cristiana personal license number - 081130. Andra is going to be the new DPS (application being put in) and she showed us that she could fully use the CCTV Camera System.
4. I checked the CCTV Cameras 6,7,8 and 12. We found that 6,7 and 8 seemed to be distorted due to it being placed beside or very close to a bright light, but I could still see faces of the staff that the Cameras was aimed at. Camera 12 which faces the dance floor was grainy and I was unable to see any faces due to the distortion. I pointed this out to Ronnie and Andra, I was told that they are getting someone to come into to look at it, they have believe it's due to lack of power feeding into it. I explained that if there was an incident on the dance floor we would not be able to identify any from that picture.
5. Fire escape all the way to the shared stairs were clear, but in the shared area there were some work men's clothes on the steps. I advised them that they need engage with the workers next door as they have a duty of care towards their customers, and if there is an emergency the things on the stairs could prevent a speedy exit or worse case trip someone over. They said they would try to make contact with them.
6. Male and female toilets had attendants who also carried radios
7. Spoke with Head doorman Chris, who seemed to be very switched on he also wears a body cam which is switched on anytime he is called to an incident

31.01.2018 L Cavill (with police)... Premises had only just opened, so a joint licensing inspection from police licensing and City Inspectors was carried out. The DPS was unsure of how to use the CCTV when requested. The SIA team at the front door were not wearing a high vis, and were not using the wands for searching. The rear fire exit was partially blocked by tools, that were being used for building works within the building.

10.03.2018 L Cavill ( walk through of new premises. ) ... The premises was open for a soft opening, and safety issues were highlighted during a walk through of the premises.

#### **Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions**

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4.
  - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
    - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
      - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
      - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
    - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
    - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6.
  - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.



- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -
  - (a) a holographic mark, or
  - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that -

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
  - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
  - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
  - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8. (i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -

- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
  - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
  - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or



- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
  - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
  - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (iv).
  - (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
  - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### **Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority**

9. Prior to 23:00 customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
10. An attendant shall be on duty in the cloakroom during the whole time that it is in use.
11. The number of persons permitted on the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 235 persons.
12. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
13. There shall be a Personal Licence Holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.
14. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all other persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
15. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licence holder to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
16. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
17. The consumption of alcohol on the premises shall cease 30 minutes after the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol.
18. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
19. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised session and will record the following:
  - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
  - (b) all ejections of patrons
  - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
  - (d) any incidents of disorder
  - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
  - (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment
  - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
21. After 23:00 hours, there should be no consumption of drinks (excluding hot drinks) from vessels other than polycarbonate vessels. This condition shall not apply to the serving and consumption of wine, sparkling wine, spirits or champagne bottles with a minimum size of 70cl and champagne flutes supplied by waiter/waitress service to tables. Staff shall clear all empty wine, spirit and champagne bottles promptly from



the tables. Customers shall not be permitted to leave their table carrying any such glass bottles or drink directly from the bottle.

22. Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
23. After 23:00 hours, all customers entering the premises will have their 1D scanned on entry.
24. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
25. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
26. All emergency exit doors shall be available at all material times without the use of key, code, card or similar means.
27. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
28. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.
29. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
30. All fabrics, curtains, drapes and similar features including materials used in finishing and furnishing shall be either non-combustible or be durably or inherently flame-retarded fabric. Any fabrics used in escape routes (other than foyers), entertainment areas or function rooms, shall be non-combustible.
31. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport, proof of age card with the PASS Hologram or Military ID card.
32. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
33. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
34. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
35. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
36. No collections of waste or recycling materials (including bottles) from the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day.
37. From 21:00 hours, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), a minimum of 2 SIA door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises. A minimum of one shall be deployed at



the entrance and shall wear a Body Worn Video Camera. Additional door supervisors shall be employed as determined by a documented management risk assessment taking cognizance of police advice of 1 SIA per 100 customers before 23.00hrs and 1 SIA per 50 customers thereafter, (or such other advice as may be given from time to time). At all times from 23:00 hours, 2 door supervisors shall be deployed at the entrance. The risk assessment to be made available upon request.

38. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system (including where applicable any Body Worn Video system) shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
39. A minimum of 5 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises from 23.00hrs to close 7 days per week. A minimum of 2 on the entrance and 3 inside the premises (This is still subject to discussion based on what the premises is to become) Prior to this time door staff numbers will be at least a 1:100 ratio unless decided otherwise by a risk assessment conducted by a member of the venue's management team.
40. At least 2 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises at all times whilst it is open for business. A minimum of one to be wearing Body Worn Video throughout trading times and for 30 minutes after closing whilst dispersing
41. After 21.00hrs any persons entering or re-entering the premises shall be searched by a SIA licensed member of staff and monitored by the premises CCTV system. Search wands will be used during all searches.
42. Body worn video systems used by the premises must be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of staff
43. All staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure they are confident in its use. A record will be kept on the premises of which staff have been trained. This record will be available to the relevant authority for inspection upon request
44. Where the premises are operating for a specific pre-booked event or occasion when a guest list is in operation, only a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager will be authorised to add additional names to the guest list. Any additions less than 48 hours before the pre-booked event or occasion must be legibly entered on the list and signed for by a Director, the Premises Licence Holder, the Designated Premises Supervisor or the Duty Manager. The list will be kept for a period of 31 days following the event and will be made available immediately for inspection upon the request by a Police Officer or Council Officer.
45. After 21:00, or such other time as agreed with the Police in writing (and a copy of any agreement to be made available upon request), all security engaged outside the entrance to the premises, or supervising or controlling queues, shall wear high visibility yellow jackets or vests.
46. All externally promoted events held at the venue shall be notified to the Metropolitan Police Service. A form 696 will be completed and submitted within 14 days prior to the event, or such less time as agreed with the Police. When carrying out the risk assessment for the event and holding the event the venue will take into account any reasonable advice received from the Westminster Police Licensing Team and the central Clubs/Promoters Police Team who receive the form 696 (or their equivalent) and upon a reasonable request by Police the venue will not run the event.



47. After 23:00 hours, or such earlier time as deemed necessary following risk assessment, a search policy shall be implemented of customers entering the premises. Such policy to be documented having regard to police advice and shall be made available upon request.
48. a) From 23:00 hours, a minimum of 2 door supervisors shall be deployed with Body Worn Video Camera, capable of recording audio and video in any light condition as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. The video cameras shall be used until 30 minutes after closing whilst customers are dispersing.
- b) All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- c) A Body worn video system shall be deployed immediately during any verbal altercation or use of force made by any member of door staff.
- d) All door staff engaged in the use of Body Worn Video shall receive relevant training to ensure that they are confident in its use. A record shall be kept on the premises of which door staff have been trained. This record will be available to the Police or Licensing Authority for inspection upon request.
