The premises is located within the West End Cumulative Impact Area and as such various policy points must be considered, namely CIP1, HRS1, PB2 and MD2.

The premises currently benefits from a separate premises licence (19/11486/LIPT) and the applicant has applied for a new application with longer hours. As such, the operating hours applied for licensable activities currently fall outside of Westminster's core hours. For premises for the supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises and other licensable activities, the Licensing Authority encourage that the applicant reduce the hours to be within Westminster's Core hours;

The Licensing Authority note that within the operating schedule the applicant proposes the premises is a Lounge Bar. The application as it currently stands falls within Westminster's PB2 and MD2 Policy. It is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications in the Cumulative Impact Areas other than applications to vary hours within Core Hours under Policy HRS1. Paragraphs 2.5.23 and 2.5.48 states that the Licensing Authority considers that new applications for pubs and bars plus premises offering facilities for music and dancing in the Cumulative Impact Areas should be refused save where an applicant can demonstrate exceptional circumstances.

With regard to Policy PB2, there is no ancillary nature to the way in which alcohol is served at the premises and the Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions on how the supply of alcohol will be controlled and monitored. i.e. will the premises operate with waiter/waitress service or by way of a bar with vertical drinking?

The applicant has applied for the sale by retail of alcohol both on and off the premises. The Licensing Authority would encourage the applicant to provide further submissions as to the

proposed operation of the 'off sales' from the premises, and how this is intended to be operated and controlled to ensure that there is no adverse impact within the West End Cumulative Impact Area.

As previously mentioned, the premises currently benefits from a separate premises licence (19/11486/LIPT), the Licensing Authority would encourage further submissions as to if this licence will be surrendered as it is not stated in the operating schedule. Would the applicant consider Westminster's model condition 62?

1. *No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until premises 19/11486/LIPT (or such other number subsequently issued for the premises) has been surrendered [and is incapable of resurrection].*

The Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions as to how the premises will not add to cumulative impact in the West End cumulative impact area, in accordance with policy CIP1.

Therefore, it is a decision for the Licensing Sub-Committee to determine whether the applicant has demonstrated any exceptional circumstances that would allow to depart from policy.

3. The hours requested to permit the provision of regulated entertainment will have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance within the West End CIA.

[REDACTED] and we must object to this application. It will only bring more noise and there is no benefit to the residents at all. Especially smoking people gathering in front of the bar are a big constant noise nuisance, this is an ongoing sound already. Same with guests leaving and coming or waiting in a line if capacity is exceeded at that moment. Especially a later closure of the bar will cause a big disturbance to the residents again. Many people leaving same time will finish their conversation in front of the bar will remain there for some substantial time. Also it will bring more taxis and cars lining up to pick up guests, there will be more car horns from impatient Uber drivers and rickshaws that cannot pass by. The proposed conditions are not working in reality, they sound nice, but it is not possible to enforce them: points like 15, 22, 24 and 29 are not working in night life, it may work during the day in a museum, but not with drunken people, the night life crowd cannot be kept calm, this is simply impossible. Any supervisor from the bar will not tell the guests to stay silent all the time, there is			

a constant change of the gatherings outside and she/he will have to remind them every 2 minutes, and we all know this will not happen. We ask to object and keep the license like it is. Residents must be protected by more noise and any extension of the existing licence is not acceptable.

Resident's response to the email from the Licensing Service about the possibility of withdrawing:

I strongly insist on my objection like it is, and want to add that looking at other bars like "Zebrano" what mess these late opening hours cause. The there is always a big crowd of people in front of the entrance, most of them drunk, smoking and just very loud conversations. And same like at Zebranos the responsibility of the stuff on the door ends on the main door, they do not tell guest to be silent when they are on the street in front of the building. So what they are offering does not work in real life.

I live there with my family, we have children (6/4), our windows are facing the street, we are the building next to the bar, so we accept the normal noise, but not longer that the existing hours. This will also mean others bars to follow, which will cause more nuisance. Also pick up of all guests is a nuisance.

Also have in mind that many residents are not informed about this application, because many flats are empty due to the virus and many landlords did not check their letter boxes. So I am sure this noise would be questioned the moment it is realised.

I allow myself to comment this should be done online in the future, so residents can register and received planing applications by email. Less paper and higher chance to inform everybody.

We write to make a relevant representation to the above application on behalf of The Soho Society.

The Soho Society objects to this application as it is currently presented, on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance, public safety and cumulative impact in the West End Cumulative Impact Area.

About The Soho Society

The Soho Society is a charitable company limited by guarantee established in 1972. The society is a recognised amenity group and was formed to make Soho a better place to live, work or visit by preserving and enhancing the area's existing diversity of character and uses, and by improving its facilities, amenities and environment. In particular, the society supports the Westminster City Council's policies, including the cumulative impact policy, as set out in the Statement of Licensing Policy.

The application

We object to this application on the following grounds,

- **Hours:** it seeks to extend the licensable activity from 00:00 to 01:30 Mon- Sat and the opening hours from 00:30 to 02:00, and on Sunday from 22:30 to 00:30. This is a significant extension of the current licence by 1.5 hours thereby permitting a bar with a capacity of 120 to be open until 02:00. We note the proposed conditions offered by the applicant but there are no conditions that can be put in place which will mitigate against the effects of a 2am bar in Old Compton Street. This application will create a new late night bar in the West End Cumulative Impact Area which is contrary to policy as set out in the Statement of Licensing Policy 2016.
- **Night time economy:** Soho is at the forefront of the late-night economy in Westminster with its numerous restaurants, bars and entertainment establishments. The area is densely populated at night with people drinking on the street, creating loud levels of noise, causing disturbance and anti-social behaviour. In Soho between **01:00 - 02:30 there are 75 licensed premises** for the sale of alcohol in Soho, ***capacity for 49 of these premises is 13,371**. This figure would have been higher as there were 15 licences where capacity was not recorded. This application will add an additional 02:00 licence to this number. We believe

this addition cannot be justified and will add to cumulative impact. (*capacity taken from premises licences).

- **Old Compton Street** is a vibrant and diverse street offering a range of mixed uses, predominantly residential accommodation, restaurants, retail shops, bars and pubs. It attracts large numbers of people during the daytime but even greater numbers at night due to the high number of evening / late night premises. There are **31** such premises, **22 restaurants, 4 bars, 4 pubs and 1 members club** with licences between the hours of **00:00 - 03:30 with a capacity of 2,033 for 18 premises** (capacity not stated on 13 licences). The breakdown shows **20 licences until 00:00, capacity 483 for 8 premises** (12 not recorded), **7 until 01:00, capacity 845** (1 not recorded) and **4 until 03:00, capacity 695**. The street is already saturated with premises serving alcohol and it cannot accommodate another late night licence.

Old Compton Street is also surrounded by streets densely populated with late night venues, **Greek Street** is in close proximity and has **23** premises ranging from bars, private members clubs and restaurants with late night licences between the hours of **00:00 - 03:30, with a capacity of 3,442 for 19 premises** (capacity not stated in 4 licences).

In our view these streets and including the neighbouring **Frith Street with its 23 licensed premises, capacity 2,022 (7 not recorded) and Dean Street 29, capacity 2,505 (8 not recorded)** has the largest concentration of licences than any other area in Soho, **106 in total, with a capacity to be 9,992** (where known), providing evidence that the additional licence cannot be justified in this area. We believe there are no exceptional circumstances with this case.

- **Residents - Old Compton Street:** these premises are situated in a narrow section of Old Compton Street with **8 residential flats above it, flats on either side in adjacent buildings, including an HMO**. (Appendix 1). We are particularly concerned that these residents will be disturbed by the noise from the playing of live/recorded music until 01.30, from people standing outside smoking, or waiting for and being picked up by taxis. Residents also live along the whole length of Old Compton St and due to the large number of restaurants, bars and pubs they already suffer from noise disturbance, anti-social behaviour and increased crime and disorder. It is perhaps also worth mentioning that some of the rooms in Z Hotels (on Moor Street) back on to Old Compton Street, opposite the applicant premises. Old Compton Street attracts large numbers of people on a night out either eating or drinking in the numerous premises or just walking through and hanging around. It is an extremely busy and noisy street late at night attracting criminal activity and public nuisance (see Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Prevention of Nuisance below).
- **Extended hours and COVID 19:** this is the latest in a series of applications for significantly extended hours in Soho and we are concerned this trend will continue as the result of the effect of COVID on the hospitality industry. We consider this balance has for some time been in favour of late night premises which in turn has led to a deterioration and reduction in residential amenity. It is vital that the interests of residents are protected, whilst the authorities do what they can to help businesses.

Whilst we acknowledge the difficulties for restaurants, bars, pubs, cinemas and theatres, we also maintain our position that there needs to be a balance between the late night economy and residents. The Soho Society has been broadly supportive of the Westminster's plans to reopen the hospitality industry and in Soho this included road closures and pavement licences allowing additional tables and chairs in the streets creating an Al Fresco experience. Since the reopening on the 4th of July, Old Compton Street and those that surround it are busier now than in pre-COVID times, seeing a large increase in the number of people on the streets, as borne out by recent photographs in Appendix 2. This has had a negative impact on residents who state the effect of the large number of people on the street even after the removal of

tables and chairs at 11pm has resulted in a significant increase in noise and general disturbance

which includes buskers playing loud amplified music. The police also cite an increase in crime,

in particular theft from person. Soho has always been a destination but even more so now.

Old Compton Street with its large number of consecutive restaurants and bars attracts large numbers of

people and, coupled with its tightly packed tables and chairs, has resulted in social distancing being

difficult to maintain, even for people attempting to walk along the pavement. This in effect is a mass gathering created by the sheer number of people crowded into this small street.

Due to the large number of late night licences this area remains extremely busy throughout the night. If you add to this an additional 120 people drinking cocktails until 2am, the rule of social distancing will either be impossible or severely compromised. The hours proposed will cause

a

nuisance and are likely to result in an increase in crime and disorder, both to residents in the immediate

vicinity and by having a 'cumulative impact' on Soho in general.

Statement of Licensing Policy 2016

Reviewing the Statement of Licensing Policy, the following policies apply to this application;

a) Policy HRS1 - Hours; applications for hours outside of the core hours set out below in this policy will be considered on their merits, subject to other relevant policies and with particular regard to the following:

b) Policy CIP1 - Special policy on cumulative impact in Cumulative Impact Areas; it is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications in the Cumulative Impact Areas for: pubs and bars, fast food premises, and premises offering facilities for music and dancing; other than applications to vary hours within the Core Hours under Policy HRS1. ***The Licensing Authority considers that the grant of variations or new licences for pubs and bars in the Cumulative Impact Areas should be limited to exceptional circumstances*** (our emphasis).

2.4.25: *'The Licensing Authority's view is that cumulative impact in the Cumulative Impact Areas arises mainly from the numbers of bars, music and dance premises and fast food premises.'*

2.4.1: *'...The retention of people late at night contributes to the cumulative impact.'*

2.4.13: *'Proximity to residential accommodation is a general consideration with regard to the prevention of public nuisance. However the absence of residential accommodation in the vicinity of premises in an area of cumulative impact is not a reason for exception. The nature of cumulative impact is that it is cumulative and affects not only the immediate vicinity of the premises, but a wider area; thus the number of people visiting the premises, the nature of licensable activities and the lateness of operations have an impact on an area as a whole, irrespective of whether or not there is residential accommodation in proximity to the premises.'*

2.4.5: *'Therefore, a case is most unlikely to be considered exceptional unless it is directed at the underlying reason for having the policy. Exceptions to the Cumulative Impact Area policies to refuse certain types of applications must be for genuinely exceptional reasons.'*

The applicant has not provided reasons for the proposed extension in hours, they have not presented a case for exceptional circumstances.

c) Policy PB2 - Pubs and Bars in the Cumulative Impact Areas; it is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications in the Cumulative Impact Areas other than applications to vary hours within the Core Hours under Policy HRS1.

2.5.22: states, ‘... premises that primarily serve alcohol, with or without the provision of any ancillary playing of music, can give rise to public nuisance for residents and other businesses, particularly where there is a large concentration of such premises. This is principally due to noise from the premises and from patrons when they leave. Pubs and bars present opportunities for crime and they can also give rise to disorder.’

We have provided evidence of the large number of late night premises in Old Compton St and the surrounding streets, **106 in total, within this number there are 15 clubs, 13 bars and 11 pubs** demonstrating there cannot be any exception to policy and this application should be refused.

The Licensing Objectives

This application fails the policy test and also fails to promote the licensing objectives and we object on the following grounds.

Prevention of crime and disorder - CD1

Under this Policy the criteria applied is, ‘*whether the premises make or will make a significant contribution to levels of crime and disorder, and whether the operating schedule is based on an adequate risk assessment, undertaken by the applicant, of the light likelihood of crime and disorder occurring as a result of the grant of the application.* Under ‘*Considerations, (1) the levels of crime and disorder in and around the venue; and the proposals contained in the operating schedule.*’ Below we highlight the existing high levels of crime and disorder in Soho.

Criminal activity associated with the late-night economy / venues and large numbers of people on the streets results in high levels of serious crime. In Soho the majority of robberies take place late at night. People are targeted as they leave late night venues which is evidenced by the crime figure. Figures for Soho highlight a huge increase in robberies, * 111 robberies took place within the four-month period from Nov - Feb 2017/18, for the same period in 2018/19 the figure was 266 an increase of 140%. Figures for theft from person also show a similar increase 401 for the same period in 2017/18 to 1,028 in 2018/19, a significant increase of 156%. (*Source; Police UK data).

Comparison of crime statistics by street - September 2019 to February 2020

**Old Compton St : Robbery = 19, Theft person = 162, Violence with injury = 47.
All crime = 429.**

Dean St : Robbery = 12, Theft person = 57, Violence with injury = 30. All crime = 280.

Greek St : Robbery = 12, Theft person = 76, Violence with injury = 33. All crime = 244

Frith St : Robbery = 13, Theft person = 46, Violence with injury = 23. All crime = 143.

As you can see Old Compton Street records the highest number of crimes compared to the other streets which surround it - **200% more crime than Frith Street, 75% more than Greek Street and 53% more than Dean Street.**

Criminal activity is not limited to these types of crimes at night, these streets also attract drug dealers who are in the area targeting people as they leave premises, there are more dealers in the area at night than during the day which is linked to the large number of late night venues which creates the drug market.

We have provided evidence of the high levels of crime in this street and surrounding area, and as the Licensing Policy 2.5.22 confirms, ‘*Pubs and bars present opportunities for crime and they can also give rise to disorder.*’ We believe if the application is granted it will contribute to the existing levels of crime and disorder and therefore should be refused.

Prevention of public nuisance - Policy PN1

Under this Policy the criteria applied states, '*the potential for nuisance associated with the style, characteristics and activities of the business to be carried on at the premises and the potential steps which could be taken to reduce the risk of a nuisance occurring. This will particularly apply in areas of residential accommodation and where there is residential accommodation in the proximity of the premises.*'

There are a large number of residential properties on Old Compton Street, and at night the street becomes the 'venue' where large numbers of people gather outside the bars and restaurants or just walk through. It is extremely noisy which is compounded by pedicabs parked in the street blaring out loud music creating a significant noise nuisance. Residents already suffer from noise disturbance, nuisance and antisocial behaviour. The nature and characteristics of a bar can also give rise to disorder, noise and disturbance. Residents live above and beside these premises and being in such close proximity it will have a detrimental impact on their residential amenity.

Public Safety - PS1

Under this objective the applicant needs to '*... demonstrate that the public will be safe within and in the vicinity of the premises,*' and goes on to state '*Crime, disorder and antisocial behaviour inside and in the vicinity of licensed premises may threaten public safety and affect perceptions of public safety.*' Drunk and highly intoxicated people on the streets late at night are very vulnerable requiring support and to prevent them from becoming victims of crime. To help people who become vulnerable on a night out Westminster City Council with the LGBT foundation has established the Soho Angels. As the Committee will know, these are group of volunteers who work on Friday and Saturday nights between 10pm and 5am helping vulnerable or distressed people on a night out. They work with St. John Ambulance who provide medical assistance at an eight-bedded night hub in St. Anne's Church on Dean Street. In their first year of operation they helped over 1,200 people, with medical assistance being given to 230 cases of which 80 were classed as serious incidents, and 40 crimes were reported. This is further evidence of the impact of the high number of late night uses and large numbers of people out on the streets such that a dedicated team of volunteers is required to help the vulnerable, keeping them safe from harm. However, due to the current pandemic they are not currently working.

Licensing Policy - Cumulative Impact

This area has been identified by the Westminster City Council (2.4.1 of the Statement of Licensing Policy, as amended) as under stress because the cumulative effect of the concentration of late night and drink led premises and night cafes has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses.

The policies in relation to the stress areas are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (2.4.5 of the policy). The policies are intended to be strict and will only be overridden in genuinely exceptional circumstances (2.4.2 of the policy). The growth in the entertainment industry in Soho has led to a marked deterioration in the quality of life and well-being of local residents and it has jeopardised the sustainability of the community. Soho has a substantial residential community and many of these residents suffer from problems such as, but not limited to, high levels of noise nuisance, problems with waste, urinating and defecating in the streets, threats to public safety, anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder and the change in character of historic areas.

The application proposes to add an additional late night bar to 02:00 with a capacity of 120. There are **31** licensed premises in Old Compton and including the surrounding streets the **total is 106, 66 restaurants, 15 clubs, 13 bars, 11 pubs, 1 office, with a capacity of 9,992** where recorded (33 not recorded). Any increase in the number of people on the streets late at night will add to cumulative impact in the West End CIA.

Conclusion

In conclusion, this application aims to permit a late night bar in an area already saturated with licensed premises, in close proximity to residential properties, in the cumulative impact area. We respectfully request this application is rejected.




Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4.
 - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6.
 - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that—

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -

- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
 - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Conditions reproducing the effect of conditions subject to which the relevant existing licenses have effect.

Conditions relating to regulated entertainment- Music, Dancing and Entertainment of a Like Kind

9. This licence is subject to all the former Rules of Management for Places of Public Entertainment licensed by Westminster City Council, in force from 4 September 1998 and incorporating amendments agreed by the Council on 25 October 1999, 30 June 2000, 16 January 2001 and 1 October 2001.
10. On New Year's Eve the premises can remain open for the purpose of providing regulated entertainment from the time when the provision of regulated entertainment must otherwise cease on New Year's Eve to the time when regulated entertainment can commence on New Year's Day (or until midnight on New Year's Eve where no regulated entertainment takes place on New Year's Day).
11. Notwithstanding the provisions of Rule of Management No. 6 the premises may remain open for the purposes of this licence from 23:00 to 00:00 midnight on the days Monday to Saturday.
12. This licence shall have no effect on Bank Holidays.
13. The entertainment to be provided under this licence shall remain purely ancillary to the main use which is A3 (Food and Drink).
14. The entertainment to be provided under this licence shall be limited to recorded background music with occasional D.J. and related dancing.

15. A noise limiter located in a separate and remote lockable cabinet from the volume control must be fitted to the musical amplification system set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service's Community Protection Department so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officers from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the applicant only and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.
16. No alteration or modification to any existing sound systems(s) should be effected without the prior knowledge of an authorised officer of the Council's Environmental Health Department.
17. Any additional sound generating equipment shall not be used on the premises without the being routed through the sound limiter device.
18. All waste is paid for, properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the stated collection time.
19. No unauthorised advertisements of any kind (including placard, poster, sticker, flyer, picture, letter, sign or other mark) is inscribed or affixed upon the surface of the highway, or upon any building, structure, works, street furniture, tree or any other property, or is distributed on street to the public, that advertises or promotes the establishment, its premises, or any of its events, facilities, goods or services.
20. The alleyway shall not be used for storage, deliveries or refuse and the exit door to the alleyway shall not be used except in an emergency.
21. The front entrance lobby doors shall not be propped or secured in an open position.
22. The licensee shall liaise with the Council's Environmental Health Department to provide adequate sound attenuation to the satisfaction of the Council, including the checking of the sound limiter.
23. Legible notices to be displayed at all exits from the premises requesting patrons to respect the need of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly and not slam car doors.
24. Patrons shall be requested to leave quietly and respect the needs of residents. The licensee shall ensure that the exit of patrons from the premises is monitored so that minimal noise and disturbance is caused to residents.
25. Patrons who regularly leave the premises in a noisy fashion will be refused entry to the premises on future occasions, and a notice to that effect will be clearly displayed so that all patrons exiting the premises are notified of this requirement.
26. Staff shall be requested to leave quietly and respect the needs of residents. The licensee shall ensure that the exit of staff from the premises is monitored so that minimal noise and disturbance is caused to residents.
27. The number of persons accommodated at any one time shall not exceed: Basement - 110, Ground Floor - 83

Conditions related to Sale of Alcohol

28. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages shall be equally available throughout the permitted hours.

29. On any evening where the premises or part of the premises are open for music and dancing and sale of alcohol is ancillary to music and dancing and substantial refreshment, intoxicating liquor shall not be sold or supplied to persons entering the premises after 11.00pm other than to; a) persons who have paid a minimum admission fee of at least £3.00 Monday to Thursday and £5.00 Friday and Saturday for music and dancing or entertainment, such charge not be credited against consumables; b) Artistes or persons employed at the premises; c) persons attending a private function at the premises.
30. No striptease, no nudity and all persons on the premises to be decently attired.
31. No gaming otherwise than by machines authorised under part III, Gaming Act, 1968.
32. There shall be no payment made by or on behalf of the licensees to any person for bringing customers to the premises.
33. CCTV will be installed in the whole of the licensed areas and in particular cameras to be placed to cover the toilet entrance to the dancers changing room. All cameras will continually record whilst the premises are open to the public. The tapes will be retained for a period of 28 days, time/date stamped, and made available to the statutory authorities upon request (all areas are to be sufficiently lit, in order that the recorded images are of reasonable quality).

Conditions which reproduce the effect of any restriction imposed on the use of the premises by specified enactments

Conditions related to the Sale of Alcohol

34. (i) Monday to Saturday

(a) Subject to the following paragraphs, the permitted hours on weekdays shall commence at 10.00 (12.00 on Christmas Day and Good Friday) and extend until 00.00 on the morning following

(b) The sale of alcohol must be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.

(c) The permitted hours on New Year's Eve will extend to the start of permitted hours on the following day, or if there are no permitted hours on 1 January, to 00.00 on New Year's Eve.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (d) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (e) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (f) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (g) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;

- (h) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

(ii) Sunday

- (a) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, 12.00 noon to 22.30.
- (b) On Christmas Day, 12.00 to 15.00 and 19.00 to 22.30.
- (c) On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12.00 to 22.30.
- (d) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, 00.00 midnight on 31st December).

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

35. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

(a) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.

(b) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.

(c) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.

(d) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

36. If any entertainment is provided for children or if an entertainment is provided at which the majority of persons attending are children, then, if the number of children attending the entertainment exceeds 100, it shall be the duty of the holder of the premises licence (or the holder of the club premises certificate):

(a) to station and keep stationed wherever necessary a sufficient number of adult attendants, properly instructed as to their duties, to prevent more children or other persons being admitted to the building, or to any part thereof, than the building or part can properly accommodate,

(b) to control the movement of the children and other persons admitted while entering and leaving the building or any part thereof, and

(c) to take all other reasonable precautions for the safety of the children.

37. The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Mandatory Conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4.
 - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or

less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
7. The responsible person must ensure that—
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

10. The number of persons permitted in the premises at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed;
Basement (60) persons.
Ground Floor (60) persons
11. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
12. After 23.00 hours on Thursday Friday and Saturday a minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the premises at all times whilst it is open for business.
13. Customers shall not enter or leave the premises from Greek Court except in the event of an emergency.
14. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
15. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
16. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
17. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21.00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
18. There shall be no admittance or re-admittance to the premises after midnight except for patrons permitted to temporarily leave the premises to smoke.
19. There shall be no sales of alcohol for consumption 'Off' the premises after 23.00 hours.
20. A noise limiter must be fitted to the musical amplification system set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service, so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents or businesses. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured by key or password to the satisfaction of officers from the Environmental Health Service and access shall only be by persons authorised by the Premises Licence holder. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service. No alteration or modification to any existing sound system(s) should be effected without prior knowledge of an authorised Officer of the Environmental Health Service. No additional sound generating equipment shall be used on the premises without being routed through the sound limiter device.
21. A Challenge 21 or Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
22. There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.00.

23. After 23:00 patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
24. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons drinking and/or smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
25. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
26. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
27. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
28. The premises may remain open for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment from the terminal hour for those activities on New Year's Eve through to the commencement time for those activities on New Year's Day.
29. On the morning that Greenwich Mean Time changes to British Summer Time one hour will be added to the terminal hour of any activities and to the closing time for the premises where the existing terminal hour for the activities and/or closing hour for the premises ends after 01.00 hours.
30. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
31. After 23.00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall be limited to 10 persons at any one time.
32. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
33. Patrons shall be requested to leave quietly and respect the needs of residents. The licensee shall ensure that the exit of patrons from the premises is monitored so that minimal noise and disturbance is caused to residents.
34. No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day.
35. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
36. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
37. No collections of waste or recycling materials (including bottles) from the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day
38. After 21.00 hours Greek Court shall not be used for the movement of storage, deliveries or refuse and the exit door to the Greek Court shall not be used except in an emergency.

39. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
40. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.

Conditions proposed by the Metropolitan Police and agreed with the applicant so as to form part of the operating schedule.

41. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:
- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
42. In the basement area, other than pre-booked and bona fide private functions or events to which members of the public are not admitted, the supply of alcohol will be by waiter or waitress service only and shall only be to a person who is seated.

Conditions proposed by the Licensing Authority

43. No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until premises 19/11486/LIPT (or such other number subsequently issued for the premises) has been surrendered [and is incapable of resurrection].
