I refer to the application for a new Premises Licence for the above premises which is located in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone (CIZ).

A plan of the premises (no reference) has been submitted in support of the application.

The applicant is seeking the following:

1. Supply of Alcohol for 'Off' the premises on Monday to Sunday from 10:00 to 22:00 hours.
2. Provision of Late-Night Refreshment for 'Indoors' on Monday to Sunday from 23:00 to 05:00 hours

I wish to make the following representations based on the plans and operating schedule submitted:

- 1.The supply of Alcohol and for the hours requested may lead to an increase in Public Nuisance in the West End CIZ.
2. Provision of Late-Night Refreshment and for the hours requested may lead to an increase in Public Nuisance in the West End CIZ.

Environmental Health also makes the following further comments:

- The applicant has offered a list of conditions and since the submission of the application also reduced some of what was being requested. Environmental Health

is considering this to see if this is sufficient to allay its concerns.

- It is unclear if the premises has been refurbished for the proposed use. In any case Environmental Health will need to visit the premises to satisfy that there are no Public Safety concerns.
- The Council revised its Statement of Licensing Policy this year which came into force in January 2021. One of the new requirements under the Policy is that greater emphasis has been placed on licensed premises demonstrating compliance with policy CH1, Protection of Children from Harm, (see page 36 of policy)

I write in relation to the application submitted for a new premises licence for 51 - 53 Rupert Street, London, W1D 7PQ

As a responsible authority under section 13 (4) of the Licensing Act 2003 as amended under the Police and Social Responsibility Act 2011, the Licensing Authority have considered your application in full. The Licensing Authority has concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the four Licensing Objectives:

- Public Nuisance
- Prevention of Crime & Disorder
- Public Safety
- Protection of children from harm

The application seeks the following:

- **Late Night Refreshment**
23:00 to 05:00 Monday to Sunday inclusive
- **Supply of Alcohol – Off Premises**
Monday to Sunday 10:00 to 22:00 Monday to Sunday inclusive
- **Opening Hours to Public**

Monday to Sunday 00:00 to 23:59 Monday to Sunday inclusive

The premises are located within the West End Cumulative Impact Area and as such various policy points must be considered, namely CIP1, FFP1, OS1, and HRS1.

Policy CIP1 states:

A. It is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications within the West End Cumulative Impact Zone for: pubs and bars, fast food premises, and music and dancing and similar entertainment, other than applications to:

1. Vary the hours within Core Hours under Policy HRS1, and/or
2. Vary the licence to reduce the overall capacity of the premises.

C. Applications for other premises types within the West End Cumulative Impact Zones will be subject to other policies within this statement and must demonstrate that they will not add to cumulative impact.

D. For the purposes of this policy the premises types referred to in Clause A are defined within the relevant premises use policies within this statement.

Policy FFP1(B) states:

B. It is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications within the West End Cumulative Impact Zone other than:

1. Applications to vary the existing licence hours within the council's Core Hours Policy HRS1, and/or,

2. Applications that seek to vary the existing licence so as to reduce the overall capacity of the premises.

C. The applications referred to in Clause B1 and B2 will generally be granted subject to:

1. The application meeting the requirements of policies CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1.

2. The application and operation of the venue continuing to meet the definition of a Fast Food Premises in Clause D.

D. For the purposes of this policy a Fast Food Premises is defined as:

1. A premises that provides late night refreshment, either by way of fast food over a counter, via a self-seating basis or take away for immediate consumption.

2. Food and drink are:

a. Available on the premises for self-selection.

b. Prepared on the premises.

c. Cooked or produced off the premises but brought to that premises in advance of its sale to customers.

3. The food and drink are provided in pre-sealed or open disposable packaging which is intended for immediate consumption.

Policy OS1(B) states:

Applications inside the West End Cumulative Impact Zone will generally be granted subject to:

1. The application meeting the requirements of policies CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1.

2. The hours for licensable activities are within the council's Core Hours Policy HRS1.

3. The applicant has demonstrated that they will not add to cumulative impact within the Cumulative Impact Zone.

4. The application and operation of the venue meeting the definition for a premises that provides off sales of alcohol as per Clause C.

C. For the purposes of this policy, a premises that provides off sales of alcohol is defined as a premises where the sale of alcohol is primarily for consumption off the premises (i.e. shops, stores and supermarkets, etc.)

Policy HRS1 (C) (6) states that the core hours for pubs and bars, Fast food and music and dance venues are:

Monday to Thursday: 10:00 to 23.30pm.

Friday and Saturday: 10:00 to 00:00

Sunday: 09:00 to 22.30pm.

Sundays immediately prior to a bank holiday: 12:00 to 00:00.

HRS1 (D) states: Core hours are when customers are permitted to be on the premises and therefore the maximum opening hours permitted will be to the same start and terminal hours for each of the days where licensable activity is permitted.

The application is seeking hours in excess of core hours in the West end cumulative impact zone and therefore it is for the applicant to demonstrate exceptional circumstances to allow a departure from the Policy as per policy CIP1 and FFP1.

The applicant is required further submissions on the following:

- How will food be served from the premises?
- Will food be consumed on the premises to customers seated or is it for take away for immediate consumption only?
- Is food available for self-selection or for service over a counter?

The Licensing Authority's policies, in relation to the Cumulative Impact Areas, are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole. The Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions as to how the premises will not add to cumulative impact in the cumulative impact area, as per policy OS1.

It will be for Licensing Sub-Committee Members to determine this application, given its location within the West End Cumulative Impact zone, the proposed hours and the style of operation.

The Licensing Authority looks forward to receiving further submissions from the applicant in due course.

Please accept this as a formal representation.

I strongly object to the addition of a license to sell alcohol from this shop, and any extension of hours for sale of food. This particular shop is already a problem for residents. It attracts large, noisy groups of people late at night, and seems to have become a meeting point for pedicabs, which sit outside often playing music at obnoxious volume, well past midnight.

The Rupert Street Supermarket a couple of doors along has been exemplary in the way it conducts business, and because it closes at 11pm, even though it sells alcohol, there have never been problems for residents. Even though the license applied for here is only until 11pm, because the shop stays open into the early hours, who is going to control any "under the counter" sale of alcohol past licensing hours?

This was already the problem with the 24 hour shop which opened opposite my flat on [REDACTED] - my understanding is they were caught making alcohol sales without a license, and rebuked. If 51-53 is permitted to sell alcohol, the likelihood of the license being abused after

pubs and bars close feels very high.

I know that myself and other residents have already lodged noise complaints related to the shop as it currently exists - being granted a license to sell alcohol is only going to make things far, far worse, given the inability of the management to control the noise and number of people and pedicabs which gather outside well into the early hours of the morning, creating considerable disruption for residents.

It is not necessary to have another shop selling alcohol in the Rupert Street area. There is a wide selection of alcoholic beverages for sale locally. Two doors over is the Rupert Street Supermarket. We also have the newly re-opened Co-Op, the Dodo, and Crispins. All of these locations are open till the time stated in this application (11pm).

The main concern I have is in regard to noise. Rupert Street has a history of being noisy at night, and is a destination for rowdy behaviour. This business already has groups of people loitering out front, including several pedicabs (often playing music) waiting for fares. This is not the behaviour of a responsible business working with the residents in the area.

Since they have been there there has been an increase in the number of people both using Tisbury Court and loitering in the area. They currently have a sign advertising that they are open 24 hours which they sometimes are.

There have been numerous fights connected to the premises and a huge increase in noise and nuisance and that's without the sale of alcohol so I can only imagine it getting even worse with alcohol. Soho quietens down at 3am when everything closes so I don't understand why this place should be allowed to be open until 5am.

The shop is situated in the heart of Soho's late night entertainment district, the street is known as a drug dealing hotspot, residents already suffer from anti- social behaviour and nuisance which occurs within the vicinity of this shop until the early hours of the morning, this is compounded by another 24 hour store on the opposite side of the street. Late night premises in this area attracts undesirables and criminal activity. There are very few late night refreshment licences in this area (none until 5am) the nearest of note being Wok to Walk on Brewer St with a 1am licence, these premises applied for a 4am/ 5am licence in 2020 which was refused by the Licensing Sub-Committee. This application if successful would set a precedent. The proposed sale of alcohol until 22:00 is further concern, it will facilitate an increase street drinking. We object to this application in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone, it is contrary to policy and will fail to promote the licensing objectives.</p> <p>Night time economy: Soho is at the forefront of the late-night economy in Westminster with its numerous restaurants, bars and entertainment establishments. The area is densely populated at night with people drinking on the street, creating loud levels of noise, causing disturbance and anti-social behaviour. In Soho between the hours of 01:00 to 06:00 there are 126 licensed premises with a capacity for over 20,480 people, the area is already saturated and cannot accommodate another late night premises.</p> <p>Rupert Street and the surrounds: Rupert Street and those streets which surround it is home to a number of late night venues with significant capacities. Soho attracts large numbers of people during the daytime but even greater numbers at night due to the large number of large night venues. At the East end of Brewer Street there are 5 significant late night venues which are licensed until 03:00, Madame Jojo's (capacity 300), Village (capacity 400), The</p>	

Residence (capacity 388), Sophisticats (capacity 100), El Camion (capacity 144). Of note in the immediate surrounding area there are a further **4 late night venues, 03:00 100, Wardour St (capacity 872), 03:00 Freedom, Wardour St (capacity 275), 04:00 The Box, Walker's Court (capacity 288), 01:00 Boulevard, Walker's Court (capacity 486).** In total there are **9 late night venues with a capacity of 3,253.** It goes without saying that a late night fast food premises in such close proximity to these venues will attract people who have been drinking and who are more likely to be involved in antisocial behaviour, cause noise nuisance and become victims of crime.

Statement of Licensing Policy 2020

This application as presented it is contrary to the Core Hours Policy HRS1, Fast Food Policy and Cumulative Impact Policy CIP1.

Core Hours Policy HRS1: this application seeks a new 5am late night refreshment licence which is significantly outside core hours. When considering such applications the Council must consider the effect of later opening hours on compliance with the requirements of other policies, in particular CD1 and PN1, and also have regard to the following which are relevant in this case; residential accommodation in the proximity of the premises and its impact, and the hours of licensable premises in the vicinity.

Fast Food Premises: it is policy to refuse such applications in the West End CIZ, F.30 states premises, '*....open after 11 pm can attract large groups of customers, many of whom have been consuming alcohol in pubs, bars or nightclubs sometimes some distance away. The congregation of people around these premises leads to additional noise and disturbance....*'. The Licensing Authority and Met Police are also concerned with the levels of crime and disorder outside such premises (F.31). The applicant will need to demonstrate why they are an exception to the policy.

Cumulative Impact Policy CIP1; this area has been identified by the Westminster City Council as under stress because of the cumulative effect of the concentration of late night and drink led premises and night cafes has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses. The policy provides an assumption to refuse pubs and bars, music and dance venues and fast food premises, the policies are intended to be strict and will only be overridden in genuinely exceptional circumstances (D.11 of the policy). The policies in relation to the cumulative impact zone are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (D16. of the policy). The growth in the number of licensed premises in Soho has led to a marked deterioration in the quality of life and well-being of local residents and it has jeopardised the sustainability of the community. Soho has a substantial residential community and many of these residents suffer from problems such as, but not limited to, high levels of noise nuisance, problems with waste, urinating and defecating in the streets, threats to public safety, anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder and the change in character of this historic area.

The Licensing Objectives

The Statement of Licensing Policy 2012 or Section 183 Guidance does not provide for any circumstance, exceptional or otherwise, which would permit an application to be granted if the licensing objectives were harmed. We now consider the impact of this application on these objectives.

Prevention of Crime and Disorder CD1

Under this Policy the criteria applied is, '*whether the premises make or will make a significant contribution to levels of crime and disorder, and whether the operating schedule is based on an adequate risk assessment, undertaken by the applicant, which takes account of all the relevant considerations below to reduce the likelihood of crime and disorder occurring as a result of the grant of the application.*'

The recently published Cumulative Impact Assessment 2020 presents overwhelming evidence of the year on year increase in cumulative impact in the West End Zone 1, ***it highlights the rate of crime as 10 - 13 times higher between 6pm - 6am compared to the borough average.*** It goes on to detail the number and types of crimes in the West End,

- **Public realm crimes:** (serious violence, robberies, theft and drug offences), alcohol-related callouts incidents, anti-social behaviour and demands on services were prevalent in Westminster between 2017 and 2019, among the highest in London and the country. All incidents observed concentrated in the West End many occurring in the evening and at night as well as weekends.
- **Total incident type 2017-2019:** serious violent crimes Night, 795 - proportion of Borough's incidents (31%). **Robberies Night, 2237 (33%). Theft and Handling Night, 24,407 (33%). Drug Offences Night, 1529 (40%).** Noise Complaints Night, 1389 (16%). Reactive Waste Management, 6630 (10%). Ambulance call outs to locations of licensed premises, 5353 (22%). Anti-Social behaviour on transport Night, 592 (13%), Anti-Social behaviour MPS, 9662 (16%). **Total = 50,594.**
- **Data description of incidents in 2017-2019** found all incident categories observed varied both in space and time. Many occurred in the evening and at night and on weekends when alcohol related activities typically peak. Incidents where primarily concentrated in the West End where licensed premises are disproportionately concentrated.
- **Robberies:** clustered within the West End, Charing Cross, Oxford Street in the evening and night.
- **Serious violent crimes:** recorded between **6pm and 6am** concentrated overwhelmingly in the West End.
- **Drug related crimes:** Westminster recorded the highest volume of drug offences of any borough between 2017-2019. Half of crimes were reported (48%) in the evening and night time. Drug related crimes between **6pm - 6am** were significantly clustered in and around the West End to varying degrees.
- **Theft and Handling:** most common crime type in the borough, in the evening and night they are particularly concentrated in the West End and along Oxford Street

For residents living in Soho the findings of the Cumulative Impact Assessment is unsurprising, Soho transforms in the evening and night-time into an area which feels very unsafe and where levels of crime and disorder are high. As evidenced above criminal activity associated with the large number of late-night venues and the numbers of people on the streets results in high levels of serious crime. In Soho the majority of robberies take place late at night, people are targeted as they leave late night venues which is borne out by the crime figures. Drug dealing is a particular problem, groups of dealers congregate to sell drugs and specifically target people as they leave premises, there are more dealers in the area at night than during the day, this is directly linked to the large number of late night venues which creates the drug market.

These premises are situated in a part of Rupert St (at the junction with Tisbury Court) which is a known hotspot for drug dealing and touting where people on a night out are approached, this changes the nature of the area it's lawless and feels very unsafe. People will be attracted to the area on the search for food late at night it will increase their risk of becoming victims of crime. A new off sales and 5am LNR licence on this street already know for its level of criminal activity cannot be justified.

Prevention of Public Nuisance Policy PN1

Under this Policy the criteria applied states, '*the potential for nuisance associated with the style, characteristics and activities of the business to be carried on at the premises and the potential*

steps which could be taken to reduce the risk of a nuisance occurring. This will particularly apply in areas of residential accommodation and where there is residential accommodation in the proximity of the premises.'

There are a large number of residential properties along this section of Rupert Street, including flats that back onto Tisbury Court and those that live on Brewer Street. Residents already suffer from noise nuisance caused by pedicabs gathering in the vicinity of these premises playing loud music late into the night, disturbance and anti-social behaviour will only increase with people leaving late night venues which are concentrated in this area and looking to buy something to eat, they will congregate outside with the pedicabs playing music and create a street party, resulting in even more disturbance. We are also concerned with the proposed off sales until 10 pm, since the relaxation of the COVID rules Soho has become a 'venue' in its own right, people do not only come to frequent the numerous restaurants, bars and late night venues, but also to hang around the streets drinking alcohol that they've bought from local shops. By granting another shop selling alcohol even within core hours on this street will increase noise nuisance, disturbance and the levels of antisocial behaviour to residents.

Conclusion

This area is of particular concern and well known as a drugs hotspot, where pedicabs congregate and play loud music late into the night. We are in no doubt if this application is granted it will fail to promote the licensing objectives and increase crime and disorder and public nuisance in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone.

My reasons for this objections are because this shop creates issues for the local people as it has attracted a lot of people like the rickshaw drivers and people doing wrongful businesses etc in this community who spend majority of the time in the evenings and nights loitering around, playing loud music, arguing, creating and throwing rubbish, this is mainly due to the shop selling hot foods in the night along with drinks, tea etc.

Also the shop's prices are ridiculously expensive for products like tobacco, drinks, snacks therefore I am pretty sure if the license was obtained then it would be the same. There are many local businesses who sell alcohol therefore them obtaining the license will not benefit anyone besides themselves and will create more issues for the locals. I hope this matter can be thoroughly looked into.

I wish to object to this application on the strongest possible grounds. The applicant wants to remain open until 5am. This particular corner on Rupert Street is notorious for anti-social behaviour. There is drug dealing and the noise due to pedicabs' and minicabs' boom-boxes has been unbearable for those of us in the immediate vicinity - especially over the past year. We have endured enough sleepless nights already and some of us are struggling with mental health as a result. If these premises are granted this licence, the cumulative effect will be horrendous. The Police and the Westminster Noise Team are simply not equipped to deal with the existing problems we have. It will become an even more lawless free-for-all. This is a public health issue.



We thank you for your detailed email and further details request. Applicant has considered all point raised, would like to amend the hours applied for Late night refreshment within the core hours

- How will food be served from the premises?
Food is served in paper bag.
- Will food be consumed on the premises to customers seated or is it for take away for immediate consumption only?
It is a takeaway for immediate consumption / taking home
- Is food available for self-selection or for service over a counter? self-service of cold food and hot cabinet.

Food is toasted/ or from the hot cabinet. They are trapped and served in a paper bag. Much like costa coffee, start buck etc. Food form only tiny part of the business as this is a retail store.

To address the cumulative impact - food is served in a paper bag, which can be carried away and deposit in a bin. Staying within the core hours means adding only extra 1 hour on Friday & Saturday, and extra 30mins other days, from existing late night 23.00. Infact hot food being regulated is a positive effect as applicant taking extra steps to promote the licensing objectives, i.e improvement in carrier bag, packing etc.

Alcohol is not available for self-service and concealed in cabinet - formed part of the application operating schedule.

We shall submit further steps in due course.

I am writing in addition to the Licensing Authorities Representation, dated 03/08/2021, in relation to the above application.

The Licensing Authority has raised concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the four Licensing Objectives:

- Public Nuisance
- Prevention of Crime & Disorder
- Public Safety
- Protection of children from harm

Local police officers have provided me with a report and images where they have had to speak to the applicant, [REDACTED] on 27 September 2021 at 01:30, due to the gathering of pedicabs outside the premises. The pedicab riders were seen leaving the premises or sitting outside the premises with hot food. Pedicabs are a source of numerous noise complaints within Soho, where they obstruct the highway and play loud music.

Upon further investigation it was found that [REDACTED] had been providing hot food at the time by heating it in a microwave, which contributed to the gatherings. When speaking to the police, [REDACTED] agreed he was providing hot food to "regular customers", and that he did not have a licence to do so. [REDACTED] stated he was the manager of the premises, not the owner.

I have checked our licencing register, and can confirm there was no authorisation to provide licensable activities on 27 September 2021.

I support the Licensing Authorities concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the four Licensing Objectives, in light of the applicant providing licensable activities other than in accordance with an authorisation.

Subsequent to the police visit, the premises was attended by City Inspectors where advice was given to the duty manager regarding the sale of hot food after 23:00hrs. 2

I am able to attend a hearing for this application if required.

Appendix 5

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Mandatory Conditions

1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4.
 - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or

- less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
7. The responsible person must ensure that—
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

 - (i) P is the permitted price,
 - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
 - (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
 - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
 - (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

9. (a) The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team.

- (b) All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition.
 - (c) The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises and will include the external area immediately outside the premises entrance.
 - (d) All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping.
 - (e) Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31-day period.
10. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
11. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only, and shall not be consumed on the premises.
12. The licence holder shall ensure that all alcohol within the premises are kept behind the counter, is secured behind closed doors so as they are not exposed to public, available on request by customers.
13. No super-strength beer, lagers, ciders or spirit mixtures of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises, except for premium beers and ciders supplied in glass bottles and cans.
14. No single cans or bottles of beer or cider or spirit mixtures shall be sold at the premises.
15. No more than (15)% of the sales area shall be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale, or display of alcohol.
16. There shall be no self-selection of any alcohol on the premises.
17. Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
18. No advertisements of any kind (including placard, poster, sticker, flyer, picture, letter, sign or other mark) that advertises or promotes the alcohol sale, its premises, or outdoor or any other part of property, or be distributed to the public.
19. A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the City Council at all times whilst the premises is open.
20. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:
- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment

- (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

21. No miniature bottles of spirits of 20 cl or below shall be sold from the premises.

Conditions proposed by the Environmental Health


- 22. Prominent signage indicating the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol shall be displayed so as to be visible before entering the premises, where alcohol is on public display, and at the point of sale.
- 23. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- 24. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed from or placed in outside areas between 23.00 hours and 08.00 hours on the following day unless it is during the hours for the Council's own waste collection times for the street as stated on its website.
- 25. No collections of waste or recycling materials (including bottles) from the premises shall take place between (23.00) and (08.00) on the following day unless it is during the hours for the Council's own waste collection times for the street as stated on its website.
- 26. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 27. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 28. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 29. No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until the premises has been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team at which time this condition shall be removed from the Licence by the licensing authority.
