I have considered the information that you have provided within and accompanying this application. I have also considered the application in line with the relevant policies within the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy dated October 2021.</p> <p>The applicant is seeking to supply alcohol for consumption off the premises Monday to Saturday 08:00 - 23:00 hours and Sunday 10:00 – 22:30 hours</p> <p>Following consideration of the application and how it may affect the Licensing Objectives and meeting the requirements of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy I wish to make the following representations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The supply alcohol and the hours requested to supply alcohol may have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance and may affect Public Safety within the area • As presented, the application would have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance and may affect Public Safety within the area <p>Conditions, to replace those contained within the operating schedule, have been proposed to support the licensing objectives of Prevention of Public Nuisance and Public Safety below. Proposed Environmental Health Conditions to replace those contained within the operating schedule

1. A Challenge 21 or Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
2. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only, and shall not be consumed on the premises
3. There shall be no self-selection of spirits on the premises, save for spirit mixtures less than 5.5% ABV
4. No more than 15% of the sales area shall be used at any one time for the sale, exposure for sale, or display of alcohol
5. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number and/or is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vici
6. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
7. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed from or placed in outside areas between 23.00 hours and 08.00 hours on the following day.
8. Deliveries to the premises shall only take place between 08:00 and 22:00 hours
9. Prominent, clear and legible notices must be displayed at all exits requesting staff and couriers to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
10. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
11. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business
12. No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until the premises has been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team at which time this condition shall be removed from the Licence by the licensing authority

Dear Licencing team,

I am writing to you today as the manager of, [REDACTED] to raise an objection for a new premises licence application for the sale of alcohol at 6 Norfolk Place, W2 1QN, a proposed location for Foodwise Express.

As an organisation only a couple of doors down, we want to object on the grounds of;

- prevention of public nuisance
- prevention of crime and disorder.

This area already has a high prevalence of crime, alcoholics, drug use and prostitution, which intensifies after 7pm.

Worshippers visiting the mosque have previously been targeted by alcoholics, drug users and criminals. If this premises receives a licence this will only get worse. Loitering already occurs outside the Mosque by those solicitation for sex or drugs.

During the summer prayer times and Ramadan, prayers are performed past 11pm, which may create situations for worshippers to be targeted.

An off-licence selling cheap alcohol will make the matter worse for both worshippers and local residents.

The South East Bayswater Residents' Association (SEBRA) wishes to lodge an objection to above Premises Licence application for 'Off Sales'

Our concern is that unless additional conditions are placed on the proposed Licence there is potential for noise, nuisance etc as well as potential crime and disorder in the area.

As well as standard conditions for CCTV, notices to leave quietly and no underage sales of alcohol etc we require following conditions;

- No sale of beer or cider with APV over 5.5%.
- No sales of 'miniatures' for whisky, vodka etc.
- No more than 15% floor space of sales area for alcohol.
- All spirits to be sold from behind sales counter.
- No deliveries to premises to take place between 20.00 and 08.00.
- Likewise no collection of refuse and recycling from premises between 20.00 and 08.00.

We also have concern as to sales by the likes of Deliveroo etc regarding no food with delivery of alcohol and proof of age on delivery etc

At first reading of application, we thought it was or the sale of alcohol both 'on' and 'off' the premises but now realise it is just for 'Off Sales'.

On behalf of the three ward councillors for Hyde Park ward - Councillors Adams, Cox and myself, I am writing to object to the licence application for 6 Norfolk Place on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance. This is an area where we have experienced anti social behaviour (ASB), including street sleeping, drug dealing, prostitution and noise. There are already off licences within the vicinity. There are many vulnerable people housed in hotels nearby and the police have to assist with ASB on Praed Street, Norfolk Square, Sussex Gardens as well as Star Street and St Michaels Street. While we would welcome the unit being brought back into use, it is not a suitable area to have an additional off-licence and will not promote the licensing objectives.

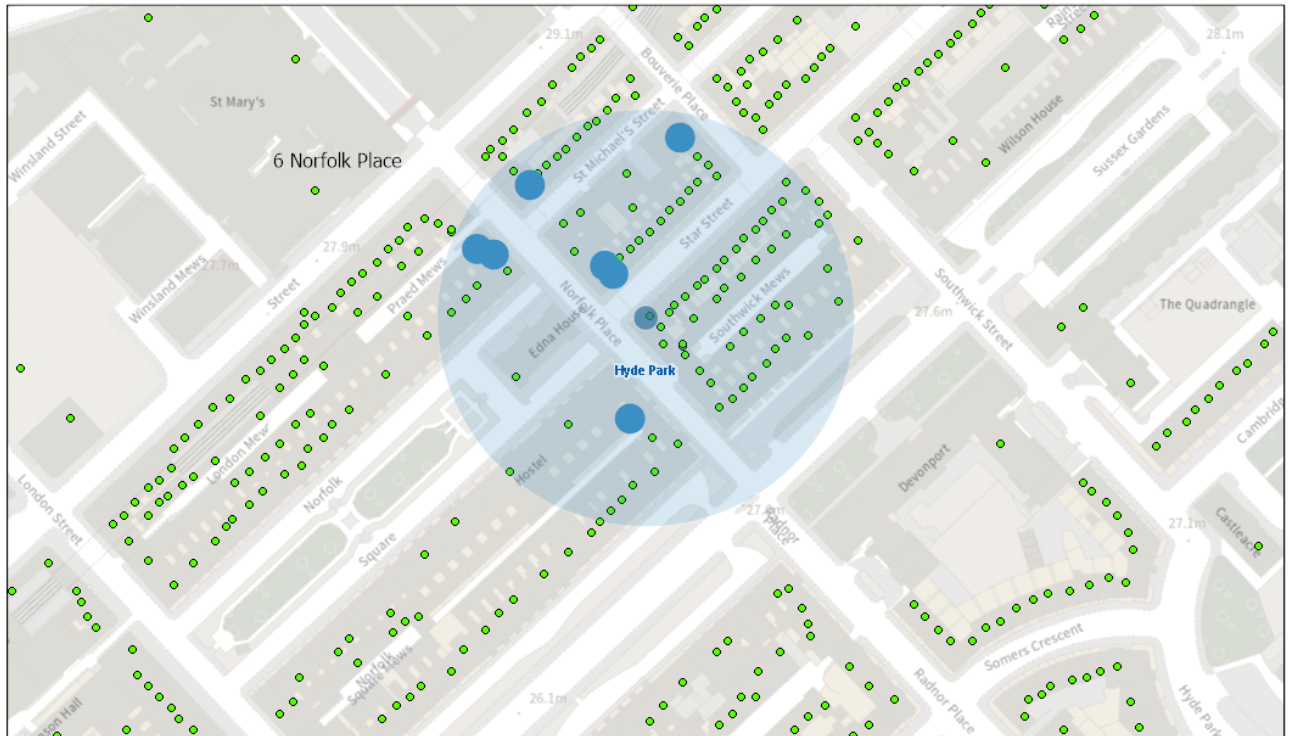

They will sign a training record confirm the above. All training records shall be available for inspection upon request by the Responsible Authorities.
18. All tills shall automatically prompt staff to ask for age verification identification when presented with an alcohol sale.

Conditions proposed by the Environmental Health Service and agreed by the applicant to form part of the operating schedule.

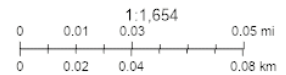
19. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number and/or is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
20. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
21. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed from or placed in outside areas between 23.00 hours and 08.00 hours on the following day.
22. Deliveries to the premises shall only take place between 08:00 and 22:00 hours.
23. Prominent, clear and legible notices must be displayed at all exits requesting staff and couriers to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
24. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
25. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
26. No licensable activities shall take place at the premises until the premises has been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team at which time this condition shall be removed from the Licence by the licensing authority.
